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Warsaw, May 21.

THe Preparations for the Campaign are made here with great diligence and application; the King will command the Army in Person, and will be accompanied with the Prince his Eldest Son. Two hundred thousand Crowns have been remitted hither from Vienna, and a farther Supply is expected from thence. The Moscovite Ambassador is expecting the return of the Express he sent to Moscow to give the Czars an account of the Proposals made by the Commissioners appointed to Treat with him for the Czars entering into the Alliance concluded between the Emperor and this Crown against the Turks. This Court is not at all pleased with the News of Count Teckley's having made himself Master of the Castle of Panowitz, it being a very considerable Post, and which gives him the means of setting all the Country, as far as Cracow, under Contribution. There is a discourse, that the King of Poland is going to send an Ambassador to the Elector of Brandenburg, but without any certainty. There are Letters from Leopold, which tell us, That the Cham of Tartary, having made a halt for several days near Caminiec, was, upon the arrival of an Express from the Grand-Vizier, marched towards Hungary. Here is an Envoy from the Sophy of Persia, but we do not hear that he comes about any business of importance. The Complaints against Count Morstein, the Crown Treasurer, are pursued by some Persons with great earnestness, but nothing will be determined therein till the next Dyet.

Genoa, May 26. The *Loyal Goring* is ready to Sail for Legborne and Messina, and the *Sarab and Elizabeth* for Cadiz: In few days may likewise Sail the *Merchants Delight* for Venice. The News we have from Cadiz of the arrival of the Galcon called the *Govierno*, from the Indies, does very much rejoice the Merchants here, who have a great concern in her.

Vienna, May 27. The Imperial Army, according to our freshest advices from Hungary, continues encamped about four Leagues from Gran, the Duke of Lorrain being resolved not to remove from thence till he has a certain account of the posture the Enemy is in. Yesterday several Boats parted again from hence with Ammunition and Necessaries for the Army. We have advyce that the Grand-Vizier, and the Aga of the Janizaries, arrived at Belgrade the third Instant, and that the general Rendezvous of the Ottoman Army was appointed to be held near that place the latter end of this Month. There is a report that the Bassa of Offen has sent to the Duke of Lorrain, to propose a Cessation of Arms for 14 days, and

that his Highness has refused it, but we know not what credit it deserves. The Prince of Swartzenburg dyed suddenly yesterday as he was at Council. The Elector of Bavaria is still here.

Hamburg, June 3. The last Letters from Copenhagen gave us an account, That the King of Denmark intended to part from thence the first of this Month for Gluckstadt, and that his Majesties Guards had already begun their March towards Flensbourg; That Monsieur Guldenstew was gone for Norway, to command a Body of Men which the King of Denmark will have in the Field on that side to observe the Swedes, who it's said are forming a Camp near Gottenburg; and that the Danish Fleet would in a very short time be ready to Sail. The Count de Roye, General of the King of Denmark's Forces, is arrived here, and has received the Complaints of these Magistrates, and to Morrow he parts again from hence, to meet the King of Denmark at Gluckstadt. From Ber in they write, That the Elector of Brandenburg has caused a very fine Train of Artillery to be prepared, and that the General Officers had received Orders to be in a readiness to March if there should be occasion. Monsieur Bierman, the Danish Minister, is arrived here from Berlin.

Cologne, June 4. Things are here in great disorder; On Wednesday last the Commonalty, upon the Magistrates refusing to yield to their demands, put themselves in Arms, and marched to the Town-House, where some Soldiers were drawn up by order of the Magistrates, under the command of Colonel Cirpricht, who finding them press upon him, commanded his Men to Fire, but they instead of obeying him, laid down their Arms, and quieted their station; whereupon the Commonalty took the Colonel prisoner, entered the Town-House, and seized the Sieur Judendoncke, and the Sieur Hesselman, two of the chief Officers of the Town, and all the publick Papers and Records; having done this, they likewise possessed themselves of the City Gates, and of the Arsenal. The chief of them are now busied to examine the publick Registers and Accounts; and it's believed they will seize some of the Burghermasters, against whom they are framing Accusations. They have sent to the Sieur Fodoci the Imperial Minister, to let him know that they are not satisfied with his proceedings with relation to the affairs of this City, and that they desire he will not stay here.

Amsterdam, June 8. The Heer Van Sommerdyke is preparing for his Voyage, the Ships that are to carry him and the Soldiers that are to go with him, to Surinam, having orders to be ready against the 25 Instant. The Men of War that are fitting out by this Admiralty, will be ready very suddenly, but those fitted out by the other Admiralties are said not to be in that forwardness. The Marquis de Villars, who is going Ambassador from his Most Christian
