

Whitehall, November 21, 1826.

The King has been pleased to give and grant unto William Baines (and not Peregrine Baines, as stated in the Gazette of Tuesday last), of Sausthorpe, in the county of Lincoln, Esq. His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue may take and use the surname and bear the arms of Emmitt only, in compliance with an injunction contained in the last will and testament of his maternal uncle Peregrine Emmitt, late of Sausthorpe aforesaid, Esq. deceased; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to order, that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in His Majesty's College of Arms.

verend Ralph Henry Brandling, of Gosforth-house, in the parish of Gosforth, in the county of Northumberland, were attacked by poachers in a field at Gosforth aforesaid, and were wilfully and maliciously fired at by one of such poachers with a loaded gun, by which firing John Charlton, one of the said keepers, was wounded and much hurt;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually fired the said gun) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
