

other improper language towards or in the hearing of the passengers travelling, or about to travel in any such stage-coach or other carriage, or being taken up or set down in or from the same, or of any other of His Majesty's subjects being in the said street or near thereto.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that no hackney-coach, chariot, cabriolet, or other hackney-carriage, or any stage-coach or other carriage used as such, shall stand or ply for hire in any other part of Gracechurch-street, than is herein before limited and appointed for the standing thereof respectively, or in any part of Fish-street-hill aforesaid.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that no caravan or other carriage used as an errand-cart, or other carriage whatsoever used for the purpose of carrying or conveying goods or passengers for hire, shall stand or be in any part of Gracechurch-street or Fish-street-hill aforesaid, for any longer space of time than shall be necessary for taking up or delivering goods, or taking up or setting down passengers, and in no case to exceed the space of ten minutes for either or any of the said purposes.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that the foregoing rules, orders and regulations be forthwith advertised in the London Gazette, and in the three newspapers circulated in the said city of London, called the Times, the Morning Advertiser, and the Public Ledger, and that a copy of the said rules, orders and regulations be also forthwith hung up for public inspection in the Town Clerk's-office at the Guildhall of the said city, pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament for that purpose.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that the foregoing rules, orders and regulations shall be in full force and effect from and immediately after the same shall be advertised, and a copy thereof hung up in the Town Clerk's-office as aforesaid, in pursuance of the directions contained in the Act of Parliament.
