

was entered the Town, and had given immediate Orders for burning the Suburb. The Emperour has sent the Baron de Gorz to the Bishops of Bamberg and Wirtzburg, to cause the Troops of the Circle of Franconia, (whereof they are Directors) to march immediately to his assistance against the Turks.

*Vienna, July 11.* So great are the Cruelties which the Turks use wheresoever they come, that several places in Hungary, to secure themselves against so barbarous a Treatment, have voluntarily surrendered to them. It is said, That the Enemy, after having burned a small Village called *Petronello*, have quitted the Siege of *Raab*. We suddenly expect 4000 Men from *Bohemia*, and 7000 from *Bavaria*, as well for the defence of this place, as the reinforcement of the Army. The Prince of Savoy is dead of the Wounds which he received in the late Action, as is likewise the Prince of *Aremberg*. Major General *Schutz* has defeated a considerable body of the Rebels, who endeavoured to pass the *Danube* near *Marchfeld*. It is said, That the Emperor will remove in a short time from *Lintz* to *Prague*.

*Hague July 15.* The States of *Holland* and *West Frisland* are Assembled here, but intend to separate themselves on Monday next, and at the same time his Highness the Prince of *Orange* proposes to depart towards the *Veluwe*, and from thence to go and visit the Fortifications of *Breda*, *Maastricht*, and *Grave*. In the mean time Collonel *Hofweghen* has received Orders to repair to *Bergbenopzoom*, of which place he is Governor. We have advice from *Munich*, That the Heer *Falkenier* was arrived there, but we have not as yet, received any account of the progress of his Negotiation with the Elector of *Bavaria*. The Deputies which the States appointed to see in what readiness their Fleet which lies in the *Texel* is, have made their Report unto them, and it is said, That the next year 12 Men of War, carrying between 70 and 80 Canons, and 50 and 60, will be added to the number which are at present equipped.

*Hague July 23.* The States General are still Assembled, but will Adjourn themselves about the latter end of this Month. Our Letters from *Germany* say, That a great part of the Town of *Gran*, as also the Castle and Magazine were blown up, but by what accident it was occasioned, is not known. In the mean time the Grand Visier has sent two *Bassa's* thither, to give him an account of the damage which the place has sustained.

*Paris, July 24.* The fourth instant Monsieur du *Quefne* arrived at the Islands of *Fromentieres*, and having joynd the Gallies and the Galleys, sailed the 18th instant for *Algiers*, where being reinforced with a Squadron of Men of War, under the Command of the Marquis d' *Amsville*, he gave the necessary Orders for the intended Attack, and the 26th at mid night threw 86 Bombs, which did great damage to the Mole, and the Houses adjoining to it: Nor were the *Algierines* wanting in making a suitable Return from the Ordnance they had planted upon the Port, though without doing any considerable Execution. The 27th, Monsieur du *Quefne* threw 110 Bombs into the place, which did great Execution, and were answered with many discharges from the Cannon, in which we lost the Sieur de *Choisem* and two Souldiers. The 28th, *Bobba Bassa* sent a Deputy to Monsieur du *Quefne*, to desire a Peace of him, in the name of the Divan;

who told him, That he could not accept any Propositions of that Nature, until all the Subjects of the King his Master, as well as all those of other Nations, who had been taken in French Ships, were restored unto him; which was accordingly performed that Evening: With a desire from the Governour to Monsieur du *Quefne*, that he would forbear all further shooting into the City; which was likewise granted; and in pursuance of this Promise, the 25th instant, the Divan restored to Monsieur du *Quefne* 141 Captives, among whom is the Sieur de *Beaujeu*, Captain of a Man of War, who informed us of the great damage our Mortar-Pieces had done unto the Town, and the general consternation under which the Inhabitants were. The 30th, Monsieur du *Quefne* received 186 more Captives, and the first of July 150, with a request from the Governour, to restore those *Algierines*, which had been lately taken by the Chevalier de *Lety*, to which, nevertheless, Monsieur du *Quefne* did not think fit to consent. The second instant we received 82 more from *Algiers*, and have restored to us since that 146 Captives.

*Duale, July 16.* Yesterday arrived here the *Bernardiffon*, Captain *Barramore* Commander, from the *East Indies*; and this morning the *Resolution* and the *Eagle*, Captain *Wiltshire* and Captain *Boneal* Commanders, who say, That four or five Ships more are coming from those parts.
