NOTICE TO MARINERS.

LIGHT NEAR BEACHY HEAD.

Trinity-House, London, August 5, 1828.

THE Coporation of Trinity-House, London, having, in compliance with the request of numerous bodies of merchants, owners, and masters of vessels, and other persons using or interested in the navigation of the British Channel, resolved to erect a light-house near Beachy Head; notice thereof is hereby given, and that as the necessary works for effecting the same are now much advanced, a light will be exhibited in the said light-house, on or about the 1st day of October next, and thenceforth continued every night, from sun-set to sun-rise, for the benefit of navigation.

The light will burn at an elevation of about 285 feet above the level of the Sea, on a spot called Belle Tote, being the summit of the Second Cliff to the westward of Beachy Head, and will be a powerful Revolving Light from Argand Lamps and Parabolic Reflectors.

Further particulars will be published in relation to the period in which the light will perform its revolution, and of the Compass Bearings within which it will be visible from Sea.
