

severed from the waste, and to be vested in His Majesty for the purposes in the said Act specified, freed and discharged from all rights of common, and other rights directed to be extinguished in inclosures during the period of the same remaining so inclosed, for the preservation of the timber thereof, according to the true intent and meaning of the said recited Acts: and whereas, pursuant to the provisions of the said Acts, certain other inclosures, called and known by the names of Little Wootton Inclosure, Great Wootton Inclosure, and Norley Wood Inclosure, were at different times made within the wastes of the said Forest, under and by virtue of commissions issued to the Right Honourable Sylvester Baron Glenbervie, Chairman and First Commissioner of His Majesty's Woods, Forests, and Land Revenues, and others: and whereas it has been represented to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Woods, Forests, and Land Revenues, upon the certificate of Robert Turner, Deputy Surveyor of the said Forest, Nicholas Bowers, Purveyor of the Navy Board, Richard Nightingale, Deputy Woodward, and Thomas White, J. S. Hollis, D. Whitbourne, Nathaniel Hives, and William Lainson, Regarders of the said Forest, that the woods and trees growing on three of the said inclosures, called and known by the names of Linwood Coppice Inclosure, Ravens' Nest Inclosure, and Fuzzy Lawn Inclosure, containing together the quantity of four hundred and forty-two acres, three roods, and two perches, or thereabouts, part of the said above mentioned two thousand and forty-four acres, are become past danger from browsing of deer or cattle, or other prejudice: and whereas it has been also represented to the Lords of the Treasury by the said Commissioners, upon the certificate of the same Officers, that the land in parts of the before mentioned inclosures, called and known by the names of Little Wootton Inclosure, Great Wootton Inclosure, Norley Wood Inclosure, containing together the quantity of three hundred and ten acres, three roods, and thirty-five perches, or thereabouts, are found not to be of a quality and description adapted to the growth of naval timber: We, three of the said Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, being satisfied that whatever woods and trees are growing and being within and upon the said above mentioned inclosures, consisting together of four hundred and forty-two acres, three roods, and two perches, or thereabouts, as aforesaid, are become past danger from the browsing of deer, cattle, or other prejudice, and being also satisfied that the lands in parts of the other said above mentioned inclosures, consisting together of three hundred and ten acres, three roods, and thirty-five perches, or thereabouts, are not of a quality and description adapted to the growth of naval timber, think fit to lay the same open and in common; and we do hereby declare and make known, that the said inclosures, and parts of inclosures, are laid open and in common, accordingly to the intent that an equal quantity of other lands, parts of the waste of the said forest, may be inclosed in lieu thereof, pursuant to the directions and provisions of the said Acts of the ninth and tenth of King William the Third and forty-eighth of His late Majesty, and for purposes therein mentioned. - Given under our hands, at the
