Exchequer Bill-Office, May 22, 1829.

THE Exchequer Bills dated in the months of April, May, and June 1828, viz. 3 Geo. 4, cap. 86, for carrying on public works and fisheries; 5 Geo. 4, cap. 103, for building additional churches, 9 Geo. 4, cap. 2, £12,000,000, 1828, with the interest due thereon, will be paid off on the 18th day of June next, when the interest will cease.
