Plymouth, August 23.

H: Dutch Fleet have been discovered about 46 fail of them p'ying about Mounts Bay and the L zard, having made feveral attempts to land fome of their men, but the Militia and the Countrey people upon the Coafts have been fo very vigilant, that they bave been as often ferced back, and fome few of them killed : the Zealand Squadron of 11 Men of War and three Firefhips, are gone from the Fleer, supposed to fail towards the Coast of

Dartmouth, Ang. 23. The Dutch Fleet are even now in view, comming from the Westwards and standing in this way, two of them are already come to an Anchor in the Range, the reft following.

Hull, Aug. 24. About three dayes fince the Orange returned into Humber, having been lately up on the Coafts of Norway, where the entred one of their Harbors, burning two veffels inden with Corn and one new fhip on the flecks, and landing fome men, entred the Town, where they got fome Booty, and returned without opposition.

Lyme, Aug. 24. Yefterday appeared S u hwards from this place, a Fleet of above 30 ail flanding to the Esstwards, suppoled to be the Durch Fleet.

Rye, Aug. 27. This morning Captain Teit, Commander of a Privateer, bath taken a small Vesselos 8 Guns, which lest the Dutch Fleet at the back of the 1st of Wight, Laving Ocders for their return home.

Lisbonne, July 31. About fourteen dayes fince, five or fix Turkish men of War appeared on these Coafts, which gave great apprehensions generally to the People for the moft confi terable partef our Brafitt Fleet, whereof four only are come in, and fix more expected, which they feared might run agreat hazurd; wherefore to fatisfi: the People, all the Frethough but thi ly furnisht with men; they were in all feven : whereof one of 16 Gans, another of 20, three more of 50 Guns a piece, one of 60, and the A imirall between 7 and 8; Guns, all of them under the Command of Jaques de Magellans their General.

The 20th. I fant five large Hamburghers lacen fr the greateft part upon the Dutch account, being out at See, difcovered three Sal, which they mifcok to be part of cur Fleet, butmeking up with them, to their great aftonishment, found to be Tu ks, who im nedistely fet upon them, and feized on 3. of them which t'ey made Prize, and burnt the other two, only one Bost full of their men escaping to shore with the

A Squadron of 8 cr 10 French men of War are, fu !denly expected in theie Sas, to joyn with a Squadron of Portuguefe filps, and together to att mp ( as 'is thought Jupan fome of the Spanish Coasts about Gallicia, where they are to be feconded by a force that is to be employed that way by Lan', which may prove as prejudicial to Spain, as of advantage to,

France, by giving them Footing in that Country.

Stockholme, July 31. The Bayeyes of the Duke of Newburgh are preparing for their departue. The Treaty b-tween this Cown and the Duke of Brandenburgh is fome weeks fince figned, by which they mutually enjage joyn ly to affift the Pol Th Republick for the preferration of their ancient Rights and Priviled, es, and eo fend th it Forces to defend them in cafe any Forreigner fall endeavour by force of Ames to impose a King upon them.

Penice, Aug 5: From Candia we have received this par-

ticular account of the Siege of that place, That on the 28th of May laft, the Turks began to make fome violent attaques up the Forts about Bethlem and the Gate Panigra, which obliged the Defendants to take more then ordinary care for the defence of that Quarter; that morning the Turks began with two pieces of Cannon to play upon those Bulwarks, which were answered by the Guns return'd them from our Counterbatteries and Courtines. The 29th, the enemy making their nearer approaches, began with two other Guns to Batter the Bulwa k of Jesus, but that night one of our Gilles in the Vale of Gioffiro was commanded to fire upon the Enemy, which being a conded by the Guns from the Works, put them In: diforder, and obliged the Prime Vitter to change that Poft. The 30th no action paft, only the Turks wrought hard in raifing a Battery against S. Andrews Fort. The 31 the Enemy plyed the Fort very fi reely, and by an unfortunare fire, killed Captein Galeaggo an Officer of Piedmont, in the Ravelin of the Outwork called St. Maries, in revenge whereof, Colonel Caftaneuf with the Savoyards under his Command, with Hand g anadoes, Swords and Piftoli, feconded by fome other Forces, that night (upon a fignal given) fell upon the Tuiks in their Works, and throwing in their Granadoes, wrought much confusion amongst them, forcing them to leave that place in great diforder; the Savoyards entring, tollowed them into one of their Redoubts, killing a great number, and sfierwards making their retreat with little lofs, leaving the Guns from the Town to play upon the enemy to hinder their pursuit, June 1. The enemies Cauon firing, dismounted a Gun belonging to the Fort Martinengo. The second, they forme hanother Buttery, and began to fire with two other Pleces of Cannon, and brought up a Galliot and another, veff:1 to unlade some Provisions, against which were sent our two of our Gilles, but their vellels were fo well defended by their Batterle', that our Gallies were forc'd to return under the rot Ction of our own Fort. The fame morning the Turks laid an Ambush near the Outwork of Mocenigo to intercept our people in the relieving the Guards, but they found fo earm a refiftence, that they were forced to fave themselves by flight, leaving a great part of them dead upon the place, and many more falling in their retreat by the flot which was made upon them from all parts. The third, the Turks fpent the morning in Ceremonies for the dead; that afternoon they fired luftily upon the Town, feading in Bullets of 80, 90, and 120 pound weight. The 4th they made their approaches within a fiones caft, and that night had a Rout skirmish before Panigra, where they were received with many Canons and a plentiful showre of Musket shor. The 5th in the morning they raifed a new Battery very near the Works of St. Mary, playing with four pieces of Canon, and began to wo kehard ar the casting up a Trench to secure a passage for their A tillery, in which they were definded by a great rumber of Masquetlers drawn thicker for that purpof ; but they received from the Town fo great a peal of Ordnance with fmall fhot and Granadoes, that they were forced to delift from their work with an extraordinary loss of men, the Befieged not losing one men, and only some few hurt. The 6th raffed no action but only from the great guns on each fide. The 7th, the Turks plyed again their Works and approaches, but with more precau ion then formerly, working under ground. The 8th, they raifed another Battery againft St. Andrews Bulwark, and be-Mirquis Ville appearing for the fecurity of that place, ordered a Counter-Battery to be well planted with Gunt, and retiring thence by the Mole, a Canon-shot from before S. Andrews firiking upon the wall, the Ma quis,by the flying of the Rones,

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
