

away from *Presbourg*, the Polish and Imperial Armies were encamped in the said Island, within a mile of each other, but were preparing to decamp, in order, as was said, to their going to besiege *Gran*, or some other important place. We cannot hear that the Turks are any where together in a body, their Forces being perfectly broken and dispersed. It is confirmed that the Grand Visier has caused the Bassa of *Buda* and two other Bassa's to be strangled.

Frankfort, October 5. We expect our next Letters from *Vienna*, will inform us that the Christian Army is set down before *Gran*, or some other place. Our last told us, The Desolation which the Turks and Tartars made wherever they came, is hardly to be expressed; it is reckoned they burnt 3000 Villages, Towns, and Castles, and that they carried away 20000 Persons, besides the great number they destroyed. We have an account, that since the raising of the Siege, a great many people have died at *Vienna*, the Air being corrupted by the stink of the Turkish Camp.

Cologne, Octob. 8. We are every day more and more sensible of the great defeat the Turks received at *Vienna*. Our Advices from *Hungary* tell us, that their Forces are so broken, that they will not be able to appear again this year in any considerable Body. And from *Vienna* they write, that there were taken in the Turkish Camp 104 Pieces of Cannon great and small, 4000 Barrils of Powder, 18000 Cannon Bullets, 2000 hand Grenadoes, a great quantity of Lead, Match, and Saltpeter, with all sorts of Instruments, and other things necessary in an Army and a Siege; and that the King of *Poland* had found in the Grand Visiers Tent to the value of a Million of Crowns, greatest part thereof being in ready money and Jewels. The Elector of *Saxony* is gone home with his Troops.

Hamburg, October 8. They write from *Rensburg*, That the King of *Denmark*, parted from thence on Thursday last in his return to *Copenhagen*. The last Danish Letters told us, That the French Squadron, which lay then before *Copenhagen*, was expecting Orders to return home; and that the King of *Sweden*, having taken a review of his Troops near *Gottenburg*, was gone back for *Stockholm*, where a great Embally was arrived from *Moscow*.

Hague, O. E. 12. The States of *Holland* have not yet agreed to the new Levy of 16000 men, demanded by the Council of State; and the Deputies of the most considerable Towns are gone home to consult their Principals therein. The Fleet of this State lies still at *Sclonevelt*. Our Letters from *Vienna*, of the 30. past, give an account, That the Christian Army had passed the *Danube* near *Presbourg*, and that it was the general opinion they would Besiege *Gran* or *Buda*, the Turks being in so great a Consternation, and their Forces so scattered, that according to all appearance, they will not be able to appear in the Field again this year.

Paris, October 13. The King has given out Commissions for 10000 men, and when these are raised, there will be another Levy of 10000, and so on, till the 40000 men, which his most Christian Majesty has resolved to raise, are completed. The Court is at present at *Versailles*, the Dauphiness having been carried thither in a Chair, because of her being with Child. The French Gallies that were before *Argiers*, are returned to *Marseilles*. and we expect to hear very suddenly that Monsieur du *Quefne*, is arrived at *Toulon*. We have an account of the death of the King of *Portugal*.

Whitehall, Octob. 4. Mr. Attourney General acquainting His Majesty, That Judgement was entered upon the *Quo Warranto* against the City of *London*; according to His Majesties Command, His Majesty out of His Princely Care to provide for the Peace and Government of the City, commanded the late Lord Mayor and Sheriffs of the City, to attend him in Council, who attended accordingly, and being called in, Sir *William Pritchard* was sworn Lord Mayor, and *Peter Daniel*, and *Samuel Dalwood* Esquires, took the usual Oaths of Sheriffs; and His Majesty then delivered to them their Commissions under the Great Seal, to hold their respective Offices during His Pleasure.

His Majesty was likewise pleased to confer the Honor of Knighthood upon *Thomas Fenner* of the *Inner Temple*, Esq; and to constitute Him Recorder of the City of *London*.

Whitehall, October 4. This day the Right Honorable Sir *George Jeffreys*, Knight and Baronet, Lord Chief Justice of the *Kings Bench*, was Sworn of His Majesties most Honorable Privy Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.

Whitehall, Octob. 5. The Chevalier de *Ballati*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Hanover*, has had his Audiences of Leave of their Majesties, their Royal Highnesses, and the Prince and Princesses, being conducted therunto by Sir *Charles Costerel* Master of the Ceremonies, in the usual manner.
