

"Customs;" and by an Act, passed in the ninth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs;" and by an Act, passed in the tenth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs;" the before-mentioned provisions of the Act, so passed in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign, have been altered and amended: and whereas by the said Act, so passed in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders in Council to be issued from time to time, to give such directions and make such regulations, touching the trade and commerce to and from any British possessions on or near the Continent of Europe, or within the Mediterranean Sea, or in Africa, or within the limits of the East India Company's charter (excepting the possessions of the said Company), as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary; and that if any goods shall be imported or exported in any manner contrary to any such Order of His Majesty in Council, the same shall be forfeited, together with the ship importing or exporting the same; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested as aforesaid in Him in and by the said Act, so passed as aforesaid in the sixth year of His reign, order, and it is hereby ordered, that so much of the said Act, so passed as aforesaid in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign; and so much of the said several Acts of Parliament, so passed as aforesaid in the seventh, and in the seventh and eighth, and in the ninth, and in the tenth years of His Majesty's reign, as impose prohibitions and restrictions on the importation of goods into the British possessions in America, and the Island of Mauritius; and as relate to the entry of vessels and goods inwards and outwards in those possessions and the Island aforesaid; and to the prevention of smuggling there; shall be, and the same are hereby, extended and made applicable to His Majesty's settlements at Sierra Leone, and all other His Majesty's settlements on the Western Coast of Africa:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The King has been pleased to give and grant unto Anne Earle, of Holton-park, in the county of Oxford, widow and relict of Timothy-Hare Earle, late of Swallowfield, in the county of Oxford, Esq. deceased, His royal licence and authority, that, in compliance with an injunction contained in the last will and testament of her late brother, Elisha Biscoe, of Holton-park aforesaid, Esq. also deceased, she may take and from henceforth use the surname of Biscoe only, and also bear the arms of Biscoe; and that such of her issue as, by virtue of the limitations in the said will contained, or of the settlements by the said will directed to be made, may hereafter become beneficially entitled to the receipt of the surplus rents and profits of certain estates therein named, may, when and as they shall so become entitled, take and from thenceforward use the surname of Biscoe only, and bear the arms of Biscoe quarterly with their own family arms; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to order, that this His Majesty's concession and declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on the night of the 28th March last, a violent assault was committed near Hell's-bay, within the port of St. Ives, in the county of Cornwall, upon the persons of two Officers, belonging to the Coast Guard Service at Portreath and Hayle, in the said county (while employed in the execution of their duty in endeavouring to seize and secure a large quantity of foreign spirits, which had been smuggled on shore at or near Hell's-bay), by a number of men, who severely ill-treated them, and fired a pistol at and wounded one of the said Officers, so that he is now lying dangerously ill;

His Majesty, for the better discovering of the offenders concerned in the said outrage, is hereby pleased to offer His most gracious pardon to any one or more of the said persons present at and aiding in such outrage (save and except the person who actually fired the pistol at the said Officer), who shall discover his or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and brought to justice.
