

in pieces; and about Five the Marquis de Baden entred the Town; the joy of the Inhabitants being equal to the trouble and distress they were in before. Our Garrison was reduced to 450 Men, and the Enemy had made so great a breach in the Lehl Bastion, that we had reason to fear we could not have resisted their next Assault: It's impossible to describe the Enemies Works, they are incredible, in their Trenches they were covered as well from the weather as our shot; nor can we pretend to give you here an account of all remarkable passages during this famous siege, from which it pleased the Divine Goodness, after Sixty days to deliver us. This invasion of the Turks has cost the Lives of 100000 Christians, besides the great numbers carried into Captivity, and the desolation of this once flourishing Countrey of Austria, is so great, that its Ruines cannot be repaired without many Millions, and many years.

Vienna, Octob 10. The Letters from the Imperial Camp of the third Instant told us, That a Party of Imperialists and Poles had been in Action with 600 Janissaries near *Newbeusel*, of whom, after a sharp dispute, they killed about 200, and took 46 Prisoners; and that the King of Poland perceiving Count *Teckley* is not sincere in his dealing with him in order to the making his peace with the Emperor, is resolved not to have any farther Negotiation with him. 5000 Men of the Circle of *Suabia* are passed by this place going for *Hungary*.

Lintz, October 8. The Elector of *Bavaria* continues at *Brun* in *Moravia*, not having yet throughly recovered his health. Prince *Waldecke* is here in the same condition. The Cavalry of the Circles of *Bavaria* and *Franconia*, are returning home, but the Infantry will Winter in *Hungary*. The Count de *Zinzendorf*, Great Master of the Emperor's Household, died here the 6th Instant. Count *Berka* will part from hence in few days for *Denmark* and *Sweden*, whither he goes in the Quality of the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary.

Lintz, Octob. 13. This night arrived here Count *Lamburg* from the Army, and gave the Emperor an account, That the Imperial and Polish Troops had defeated 10000 Turks near *Barkan*; That 6000 were killed upon the place, and 8 or 900 taken Prisoners; That among these was the *Alia* of *Silesia*, and among the killed the new *Bassa* of *Buda*, and the *Bassa* of *Aleppo*; And that the Troops in *Barkan* seeing this Body, which was to protect them, defeated, had presently after surrendered on discretion. The 10th, arrived here from *Madrid* the Count de *la Riviera*, with a Supply of 100000 Crowns. The Advices from *Hungary* are us, That the Grand Visier had caused *Ibrahim Bassa*, and 30 principal Officers more, to be strangled.

Paris, Octob. 27. From *Flanders* we have an account, That Monsieur de *Montil* had been obliged by a Body of Spanish Horse, which far exceeded in number that under his Command, to retire under the Walls of *Philipville*; That the Garrison of *Luxemburg* had surprized two or three Castles, in which were French Garrisons; and that some Troops of *Audenard* had attacked Monsieur *Bouffers* advanced Guard, and killed several, and taken others Prisoners. Monsieur *Del Val*, who was sent hither by the Marquis de *Graa*, was some days ago commanded to leave this Kingdom, and accordingly he was conducted by the Officers of the Kings Household to the *Frontiers*. Within these few days a great many Commissions have been given out for the raising of Horse, but we do not yet hear of any for Foot. From *Germany* we have the good news of a second defeat of the Turks, who were drawn together in a Body near *Gran*; they were between 10 and 12000 strong, and were most of them cut in pieces, after which the Christians made themselves Masters of the Fort of *Barkan*, a Post of great importance. And there are Letters which assure us that *Gran* is actually besieged by the Christians.
