

Whitehall, November 26, 1830.

WHEREAS it hath been humbly represented unto the King, that, about seven o'clock in the evening of Sunday the 21st day of November instant, a fire was wilfully and maliciously occasioned by some evil-disposed person or persons unknown, in the village of Willingham, in the county of Cambridge, whereby four farm houses, with barns and outbuildings, mostly filled with corn, together with five cottages, were completely destroyed;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually occasioned the said fire) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS** is hereby offered to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the said offender or offenders, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence. WHEREAS it hath been humbly represented unto the King, that, about seven o'clock in the evening of Saturday, the 20th day of November instant, Robert Harrison and James Sladden, Farmers, of the parish of Hoath, near Canterbury, in the county of Kent, were wilfully and maliciously shot at by some evil-disposed person unknown, while performing the duty of horse patrol in that parish;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually shot at the said Robert Harrison and James Sladden) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **FIFTY POUNDS** is hereby offered to any person (except as aforesaid) who shall discover the said offender or offenders, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said offence.—Such reward to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and

bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony before mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually set fire to the said hay) who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
