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## From Bonday November 26. to Thursday November 29 1683.

Stockbolm, October 31. CHe Moscovite Ambassidors having finifhed their Negotiatio at this Court; which was to confirm the former Treaties, and to cltablilh a perpetual Peace between the two Crowns; They on Saturd y laft at a publick

Audience, deliver d to the King the Inftrument on their part of the Treaty they have now concluded; and yesterday his Majestydid Swear Religiously to obferve the fame, which was performed with great Solemni y; About feven in the Morning the Gua ds and Burghers were in Arms, the latter placed in the Streets which the Ambaffadors were to pals, and the former in feveral Bodies about the Church adjoyning to the Caffle, the Quire whereof was on' this occasion Hung, and the Floor covered with Tapility; and the body of the Church with Red Cloth; Ot the right file of the Altar at a little distance was a Throne railed 3 or 4 steps, and on it was placed a Chair of State under a Canopy of Cloth of Silver Support d by four Perfons of Quality, where the King was to fit with his Face to the South, the Altar on his left, and the Ambasadors on his right hand; before the Throne flood a Table covered allo with Cloth of Silver, where, on five Cushions of the lame, were laid the Crown, the Sword; the Scepter, the Globe and Key; A little below that Table flood another, on which was laid the Treaty and its Ratificati n writ on Vellum in letters of Gold, and wrap'd in a piece of flower'd Sattin, the Ground Blew, and the Flowers Silver. Below the Throne on each fide were fat Chairs for the Senators ; On one fide of the Altar was a place prepared for the two Queens, and on the other fide for the Princefs the King's Aunt. On each fide the Quire were Galleries credted for the Ladies, Sr. About roa Clock 5 Priefts habited with very rich Copes and other Veltments, campia and went to the Altar, having a great Bible with Clafps and Boffes of Gold: Shortly after the Trumpets, Kettle-Drums, Organs, and other Inftrumental and Vocal Mulick began, and about half an hour after to the King came, preceded by the whole Court and all the Senators, into the Church, leading the Queen-Mother, as the R x Drots Count de la Gardie, did the young Queen : His Majefty was habited in a Sute of Cloth of Gold ; Soon after the Amballadors; being brought in the King's Coachoof State, and their Train in others, came into the Church, an I were conducted into the Quire, and their Train placed in the Gallerics; Immediately the Service began at the Altar, and one of the five Brieffs went thence into the Pulpit and Preiched ? which done, a Secretary read the Inftrument and the King's Ratification, and then Count Owenftern made a long Speech, which was interpreted to the Amballadors 5 which done, his Majelly came from this Throne to the Table, where the Treaty lay, and upon it the Bible, our hich his Maj fly laid the two fore Fin-gers of his Right hand, whill Count Oxenfect read to him the Form of the Oath; and then the Ani-billadors came up to the Table to led his Majeky i diane, Avenuater as The agth Juliant the Ele-Sign the Infrument, which he did with a Pen of Stor of Bavaris parted from hence in his return to

G ld.; Thence, the King returned to his Throne (all the Cannon about the City being twice dif-charged and ieveral salve s given by the Sold ers) and Count Oxenstern thanding on the first liep of it, delivered the freaty into his Majelly's hand, from, whom the Ambafladors received it ; Having made a fhort Speech, they retuined to their places and flaid there till the remaining part of the Service was finished at the Altar; and then the Messick play-ing as before, the Ambustadors and their Train went out of the Church into the Castle, staying in the Chancery till the King was some from, Church, when they were conducted to the Rix-Sale to take their leave of his Majelly; after which they riturn d to their Lodgings, where a great Entertainment was provided for them, They were prefented with 46 Veffeis of Silver of feveral Falhions, to the value of about 7020 Crows; and are now upon their Departure in order to their return to Moleo, whither they will be followed this Winter by Ambalfudors from hence, who are to fee the like Solemnity, performed by the Czars.
