

likewise tell us, That the Marquis de Brisacier, Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Poland, had had his Audience of the King of Sweden, whom he assured of the earnest desire the King his Master has to enter into a strict friendship and correspondence with his Majesty, which he not only persuaded himself his Majesty was on his part very well disposed to, but hoped he would assist the King his Master in the War he is engaged in against the Common Enemy: The substance of the King of Swedens answer was, That he did very much esteem the friendship of the King of Poland: That he and all Christendom could not but extol his Generous Resolution; That he heartily Congratulated the success of his Arms, and wished him the like happy progresses for the future; and that on his part he should very readily contribute what lay in him for the advancing the Interests of Christendom. The Marquis Del Val, Envoy from the Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, continues at the Court of the Duke of Zell, soliciting him and the other Princes of Lunenburg, to assist the said Netherlands. We are assured that a marriage is treating between the Electoral Prince of Brandenburg and the Prince's of Hanover. We have an account that the Marriage betwixt Prince Henry Casimir of Nassau, Hereditary Staitholder and Captain-General of Frizeland and Groningen, and the Princess Emilia, second Daughter of the Duke of Anhalt, was concluded and consummated the 25th of the last month, at Dessau, the Residence of the said Duke.

Hague, December 10. The Deputies appointed by the States of Holland to examine the report of the late Deputation to the City of Amsterdam, to induce them to consent to the new Levy of 16000 men, having made their Report to the Assembly, the several Members desired Copies thereof, and went home to consult their respective Principals thereupon. They returned again on Tuesday, and the next day the States were again completely assembled, but we do not hear that they are yet come to a final resolution in the matter of the said Levy. Prince Casimir Stadtholder of Frizeland and Groningen having by Letter acquainted the States General with his Marriage with the Princess of Anhalt, they have returned his Complement, and written him a Congratulatory Letter on that occasion. The Heer Van Borsele, whom the Prince of Orange sent for England to make his Compliments of Condolance at that Court upon the death of the King of Portugal, returned hither yesterday. The Deputies of the Admiralties have of late had several Conferences with those of the State concerning the new Ships that are building, as well as other matters. The States General have published a Placet against rash and profane Cursing and Swearing.

Paris, December 8. Monsieur d'Oppede, late Ambassador from this Crown in Portugal, is come back, (his Successor Monsieur de St. Romaine, arriving at Lubon several days before he parted from thence) but part of his Equipage, and what is much more to be lamented his Grandchildren about two and three years old, which were on board a Vessel belonging to St. Malo, have had the misfortune to fall into the hands of the Algerines. We had an account the last week from Marseilles, that a French Bark sent out from Thoulon, having met on

the 17th of the last month a Spanish Bark near the Isle of Porqueröles, and pretending to visit her, the Spaniards would not suffer it, but fired at the French, and killed some of their Men, who returning the like, they engaged, and after a warm dispute wherein several were killed and wounded on both sides, the French took the Spanish Bark, in which was the Prince of Montemarzio, and carried her to Thoulon; and the Son of the Marquis du Quejme, who commanded the French Bark, is come hither to give the King an account of the thing. It's reported here that the Venetians have resolved to have at Sea the next Summer 44 Gallies, 4 Galeasses, and 30 Men of War, and that in order therunto the necessary preparations are making with extraordinary diligence. We are told that the Pope's Nuncio has orders to return home.

Deal, December 2. The Dartmouth Frigate came last night into the Downs, but made no stay there, continuing her Course for the River.

London, November 30. His Majesty having taken notice in His late Royal Proclamation of the 13th of June last, of sundry Deceitful Practices used by Forreigners, in Counterfeiting the Marks, Seals, and Tilletts, of His Subjects Free of the Company of Merchant-Adventurers of England, Trading to Hamburg; This day a Tryal was had at Guildhall, London, before the Right Honourable the Lord Chief Justice of England, by John Bancks of London, Merchant, against John Martin Elkin, late of Bremen, Merchant, for Counterfeiting the said Bancks's Number 23. as also the Markes, Seals, and Tilletts of the said Bancks in imitation of his Coat of Arms, being A Cross between 4 Flowers de Lys, and for putting those Counterfeit Marks on several Pieces of Stuffs, and Transporting them to Leipzig in Germany, where it appeared they were Vended by Auerback and Winckler Merchants, as Bancks's rightfull of Goods, though in truth of an inferior value and Goodness; at which Tryal the said John Martin Elkin was by the Jury found Guilty of the same. And for prevention of the like Frauds, the said Bancks intends to fix his own Name on every Tillet, for the future.
