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Whitehall, December 12.

THE following Address has been presented to His Majesty, who received it very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty;

The humble Address of the Gentlemen of the Grand-Jury Sworn at the Assizes held at Derby, in and for Your Majesty's County of Derby, the 30th day of July in the xxxvth. year of Your Majesty's most happy Reign. And of the High Sheriff, and divers others of the Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders and Inhabitants of Your Majesty's said County, as their hearty Concurrence with an humble Address of the Grand-Jury and Justices of Peace, at the General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace held at Bakewell the 10th day of the same Month of July, in and for the said County, and lately presented to Your most Sacred Majesty.

Most Dread and Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects the Representatives of Your Majesties County of Derby, serving upon the Grand Inquest at the Assizes held there the 30th day of July, in the xxxv. year of Your Majesties most happy Reign (which we most earnestly pray may be prolonged in Peace and Tranquillity) having seen a Copy of an Address signed by the Grand Jury of this County with the Concurrence of Your Majesties Justices of the Peace there present at the last Sessions held at Bakewell the 10th day of July Instant, which was presented to Your Sacred Majesty (many) of us not then having opportunity to joy therein, but having the same Loyal inclinations, do with them (as in Duty bound) render our unfeigned thanks to the Preserver of Princes, for the great deliverance which He in His wonderful Providence has vouchsafed to Your Majesty and his Royal Highness, Your only Brother, from the Traiterous and Bloody Conspiracies of Yours and the Nations malicious Enemies; And we shall ever pray to the Almighty Protector of Princes, that He will still in mercy be pleased to defend Your Majesty and Royal Family, that no villanous Plots, or the Results of Atheistical Clubs or Associations may ever disturb the Peace of Your Majesties Reien, or the Succession of the Imperial Crown of Your Majesties Realms in the Right Line: And do assure Your Majesty that the discovery of all Plotters and Associates, shall be our daily care and utmost endeavour, and that whenever we are called by Your Majesty, we shall be ready to sacrifice our Lives and all that is dear unto us in Your Majesty's service.

Lisbon, November 23. The last week arrived here the *Centurion* Frigate, commanded by Captain *Wrenn* from *Tangier*, having brought from thence the Portuguese that were Inhabitants there. Captain *Wrenn* took a Sally-man of War upon this Coast, wherein he found 43 Moores, an English Renegado, and four Christian Slaves, which he brought in with him. The Queen of *Portugal* is very ill.

Naples, November 23. On Saturday last Sailed from hence the Spanish Fleet, commanded by the Count *d'Aquilar* for *Cadiz*, having taken on board here 300 Italian Foot. The Gallies of *Genoua*, commanded by the Duke *de Turfis*, as well as those of *Spain* and this Kingdom are to Winter here. Our Viceroy the Marquis *de Liebe* continues to employ his utmost care and endeavours for the Sup-

pressing the Bandi 1, who are become very numerous and Insolent.

Genoua, Nov. 28. We have advice that the French have taken and carried to *Thoulon* a Spanish Bark in which the Prince of *Montesarchio* was going for *Spain*. This week 60 Spanish Soldiers, which were brought in a Genoese Vessel from *Valence* in *Spain*, landed at *Final*. From *Milan* they write, that the Count *de Melgar* their Governour was recruited from visiting the most important Garisons of that State.

Piemts, December 1. We have already given you account of the taking of *Zytschin*, a place of importance to the Christians for that it will serve very much to secure their Winters-quarters, whereof we have since received the following particulars. The King of *Poland* after he had taken his leave of the Duke of *Lorraine*, understanding the Turks had a considerable Garison in *Zytschin*, which might very much disturb the communication between his Troops and the Imperialists; called a Council of War, and proposed to them whether they should endeavor to possess themselves of that place or not; most of the Council were against it, for that the Troops through the great duties they had been upon, were become unfit for present service; however the King resolved not to leave the place in his Enemies hands, and sent the Prince his Son and the Palatine of *Lublin*, on the 8th of *November*, with a small body of Horse to observe the situation of it, and upon their return gave orders for the putting what he had resolved in execution. The Turks on their side were in a posture of defence, and being informed that the King had ordered the Cossacks to attack their Suburbs on the 10th, they set fire to them the night before, which the Cossacks perceiving immediately fell upon the Enemy, and possessed themselves of one of their Gates and broke down the Palisadoes, which secured the Town. The Turks defended themselves with great Resolution, and after a sharp Dispute, forced the Cossacks again to retire, but they being assisted with some fresh Troops, renewed their attack; and obliged the Turks to quit the Town, and to shelter themselves in the Castle, the Action ceasing with the coming id of the day; The King, not to loose time, commanded an Assault to be immediately made upon the Castle, which the Turks understanding, and thinking themselves unable to defend it, they hung out a White Flag, and the Commander in Chief, with two others, came out, and prayed the King to permit them to march to *Buda*, which his Majesty granted, and accordingly they marched out, being 800 Foot and 300 Horse, and were conducted on their way to *Buda*; In the place was found 20 Pieces of Cannon, besides several small Field-pieces and Mortars, and a great quantity of Powder, with good store of Provisions;

Lintz, December 7. The Emperor received the last week 200000 Crowns from the Pope, which will be employed for the raising the recruits. The Duke of *Lorraine* has daily conferences with his Imperial Majesty and his chief Ministers concerning the prepara,
