To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble and dutiful Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Beverley, in the County of York, in Council assembled.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Beverley, in the county of York, humbly approach your Majesty to express the horror and detestation which we feel at the late atrocious and treasonable attack on your sacred person, and our deep sorrow and indignation that there could be a subject in your Majesty's dominions capable of such an outrage.

We humbly assure your Majesty of our unshaken loyalty and ardent attachment to your royal person, endeared to us by early devotion to the public service, and by the solicitude which your Majesty has continued to evince for the happiness and welfare of your people.

Furthermore we entreat your Majesty to accept our sincere congratulations on the providential escape from so dastardly and cowardly an attack; and we fervently pray that your Majesty may long be spared to wield the sceptre of these realms, and dispense blessings upon a loyal and grateful people.

Given under our common seal this 9th day of July, in the 3d year of your Majesty's reign, and in the year of our Lord 1832.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The loyal Address of the Noblemen, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the Shire of Perth.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, the Noblemen, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the Shire of Perth, assembled at a general meeting, called expressly for the purpose, beg leave to express to your Majesty our abhorrence and indignation at the atrocious and treasonable outrage lately committed on your sacred person.

Attached on principle to the Monarchy under which our country has attained to so high a degree of prosperity, and maintained so distinguished a rank among the nations of Europe, and bound by every feeling of loyalty to your person, we feel it to be our duty to unite with the concurring voice of every class in the nation, in declaring our detestation of this monstrous crime. But we feel great satisfaction in reflecting, that it was the act of an isolated individual, and that it produced proofs of the zeal and loyalty of the multitude by whom your Majesty was at the time surrounded, now echoed from every portion of your dominions, and in which it is our desire to declare our most cordial participation.
