*Cologne, January 18.* The 16th Instant the Bishop of *Strasbourg* returned Lither from the Court of *France*. This week we expect here the Deputies of *Liege*, which that City send, to make their Submission to his Electoral Highness, and their Complements to the Bishop of *Strasbourg*, who hath had so great a part in their Accommodation. Here is arrived the Baron de *Pletterdorf* from *Lintz*, and hath had an Audience of our Elector, the Sieur *Fodori*, the Imperial Minister, is returned from *Bonne*, and had last Saturday a long Conference with the said Baron, who has orders to go from hence to the Princes of the *Lower Saxony*.

*Hague, January 23.* Prince *Waldecke* arrived here the last night from *Germany*; and this morning he was to wait upon the Prince of *Orange*, with whom he had a long Conference: He has a very full power from the Emperor to assist on his part, joyntly with the Sieur *Camprich*, the Imperial Resident at the Meeting of the Allies that's going to be held here, which people begin with some impatience to expect the success of. There is very little said at present of the new Levy, that matter seeming to be laid aside. The Count d'*Avaux* has given in a second Memorial to the States, wherein he says, That he is well assured the persons that robbed the Express he lately sent from hence for *Paris*, were Soldiers of the Garrison of *Maeftrecht*.

*Brussels, January 18.* On Sunday last we received advice from *Lille*, that the Marschal d'*Lumieres* had given out orders for the drawing together a body of Horse, Foot and Dragoons, appointing their Rendezvous at *Tournay*. This news was followed the same day with that of the Enemies being on their march this way, and the night following some of their detached Troops advanced to the Suburbs of this City, on the side of the *Namur Gate*, and plundered and burnt several Houses for non-payment of their Contributions; at the same time another detachment of 3000, having with them several pieces of Cannon, marched to *Asch*, about three miles from hence, which they burnt, as well as some other places in our Neighbourhood, several other Parties being gone to *Bornebam*, *Henghen*, and other places in *Little Brabant*. Upon this alarm the Marquis de *Grans* sent orders to the Dutch and Spanish Troops, as well Horse as Foot and Dragoons that were quartered at *Louvain* and *Malines*, to march immediately hither. This morning the Enemy came again into the Suburbs of this City towards *Flanders*, and plundered and burnt about 30 Houses. We have an account from *Flanders*, that the French Troops are abroad again on that side, and the same advice we have from *Wallonia Brabant*, *Guelderland*, and *Limburg*. From *Ostend* they write, that a Spanish Man of War had taken and brought into that Port, a French Frigate of 15 Guns which was bound from *Thoulon* for *Bordeaux*. The Intendant of *Lille* hath sent a second summons to *Mons*, *Audenarde*, *Gant*, *Bruges*, &c. He demands 800 thousand Crowns of *Gant* and as much of *Bruges*.

*Brussels, January 21.* The Dutch Troops arrived here the 18th Instant in the evening from *Louvain* and *Malines*, being commanded by Monsieur d'*Ay-luz*, and within few hours after they marched again with the Troops in Garrison here, making together between 4 and 5000 Horse and Foot under the command of the Prince de *Vaudemont*; their orders from the Marquis de *Grans* were, to march to *L. A.*

to fall upon the French who plundered that place; and to cut off their Parties that were abroad burning the Country, but they made so many halts in their way, that the French were retired from *Hall* before the Van of our Troops reached that place; and in their retreat the French burnt *Zimbeck* and several other places. And on Wednesday in the afternoon the Dutch and Spanish Troops returned hither, not having had any rencounter with the Enemy. Monsieur de *Boufflers*, who commands these French Troops, is now at *Enguien*, the Inhabitants whereof have paid the Contributions demanded of them. Monsieur de *Morlat* is at *Braine le Comte* with the Troops under his command; and we are told, that the French are making preparations to attack *Stons* with their Bombs.

*Plimburb, January 15.* Yesterday arrived here a Privateer of *Ostend* with a small French Prize.

*Witchhall, Jan. 18.* His Majesty has been pleased to Confer the Title and Dignity of a Duke of this Kingdom, upon *CHARLES Earl of Burford*, by Creating him Duke of *St. Albans*.
