last-named course between Odderisland and Dyb-1 ningsisland (Dybningsholman) you get within the strongest glare of two lamps of the Odderisland Light, first of the one then of the other, and having sailed past this light, five cable lengths, you may let go your anchor in thirty or forty fathoms depth. The Odderisland Light is $26\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the level of the sea, and is lit and put out at the same time as the Oxisland Light, with the exception of the aforementioned two inner lamps, which are not kept burning between the 31st May and the 1st August. It should be noticed, that the width or opening between the shallows off Oxoë and Gröningen, a small island on the western coast of the channel in which Odderoë Light is visible, is from three to four cable lengths. In the middle of this opening, you have the line which divides the channel in two equal parts, which has the above-mentioned direction, N. W. 3 N. per compass, in which the light shows its full glare. To either side of the line, the glare will decrease, and will vanish entirely if you get within one and a half or two cable lengths off the nearest shallows.
