And on the 17th he presented to them a Memorial, by which he acquainted them by order of the King his Master, That his most Christian Majesty does persist in the offers he hath made by his Minister at Ruyoune, of a Truce for twenty years, and in regard to Spain, will content himself with one of the Equivalents proposed by his Ambassador here on the 5th of November last, or else will agree to a Truce for twenty years with that Crown. In the same manner as he has offered to the Empire. That if this State will engage that Spain shall within three months accept one of the said Equivalents or the said Truce, His Majesty will immediately cause all Hostilities against that Crown to cease, upon condition that if Spain do not within the said three months adopt either of these Proposals, the Troops which the States have now in Flanders, shall be only employed for the defence of the Places which the Catholic King possesses there, and that they shall not give him any farther assistance against his Majesty or his Allies; and his Majesty will oblige himself not to attack or take any place in the Spanish Netherlands, and further will cause Hostilities to cease in the Spanish Country, if the Spaniards do abstain from them. That further his Majesty will content to the Suspension of Arms in Flanders, as long as the present War shall continue; and will not attack any place there, if the States will engage that the Troops they have now in Flanders shall be only employed in the defence of the Spanish Places there; and that they will not give any farther assistance to the Crown of Spain.

Hague, February 22. The States of Holland had a very warm Debate in their Assembly on the 16th instant, concerning the Deputies of Amsterdam, whose Papers they ordered to be sealed up. And that night late the said Deputies left this place, and returned home. And the next day the States of Holland adjourned for several days. Zealand has not yet consented to the New Levy, and, it's said, the Towns of Middleburg and Ziricze do particularly oppose it. We are told that the City of Amsterdam, in their Protestation against the said Levy, do declare that they cannot look upon the Resolution that hath been taken therein, as an Act of the States of Holland, seeing it ought according to the fundamental Laws and Constitutions of the Government to have been by unanimous consent of all the Members; and that they do not intend to contribute anything to the charge of the said Levy. From Cologne they write that that Elector increases his Forces.

Paris, February 19. The 17th instant the Marquis de Pelleter Ambassad' from Savoy, had a publick Audience of the King; in which he gave His Majesty thanks in the name of the Duke his Master, for consenting to his Marriage with Mademoiselle. After which he had an Audience of the Duke of Orleans on the same subject; and then of the Dauphin, the Dauphine and Madam, to acquaint them with the said Marriage. The King has given out Commissions for raising 12000 men, whereof 4000 Horse are to be incorporated into the old Regiments. His most Christian Majesty hath given the Marechal d'Estrée Vice-Admiral of France 100 thousand Livres, and a Pension of 4000 Livres to the Count d'Estrée His Son. The Marechal de Solfonds, who is to command the Kings Forces in Catalonia the next Campagne, has received 30000 Livres for his Equipage, and will, it's said, part hence the beginning of the next month. The Marquis de Cheverny Envoy Extraordinaire to the Emperor, began his Journey some days ago, for Linz. The Count de Choiseul is likewise passed from hence, being desired by the Elector of Cologne to command his forces in Italy. It is said that the Pope has borrowed three Millions of Crowns of the

State of Genoa, to be employed in the War against the Turks,

Deal, February 21. Yesterday in a great Fog, a Ship came on board on the Goodwin; several Boats went immediately from hence to her relief, and found it was a French Man of War of about 30 Guns, whom they got off without any considerable damage.

Frimouth, February 14. We hear that six or seven Ships have within these few days been cast away to the Westward of this place, but we have not as yet an account what they are.

London, February 14. This day a Tryal was had at the Guildhall before my Lord Chief Justice Jeffreys, upon an Information exhibited against Sir Samuel Bernardiston, for writing and publishing in four Letters to several Persons in the Country most Standalous and Seditious Reflections against the Government, and concerning the late Horrid Conspiracy, of which he was upon a full Evidence found Guilty.

A Tryal was likewise had upon an Information against Langley Curtis, for Printing and Publishing a Scandalous and Seditious Pamphlet, called, The Night-Walker of Bloomsbury, and he was found Guilty of the same.
