

them to pay the said sum of thirty-six pounds four shillings and six pence, out of the poors' rate of the said township; and another order upon the parish officers of the township of Whitgift, commanding them to pay the said sum of thirty-one pounds and six pence, out of the poors' rate of such township; and another order upon the officers of the township of Reedness, commanding them to pay the said sum of forty-seven pounds ten shillings and six pence, out of the poors' rate of such township; and another order upon the officers of Ousefleet, commanding them to pay the said sum of forty-seven pounds seventeen shillings and three pence, out of the poors' rate of such township; and another order upon the officers of the township of Fockerby, commanding them to pay the said sum of twelve pounds four shillings out of the poors' rate of such township; and another order upon the officers of Adlingfleet, commanding them to pay the said sum of twenty-nine pounds thirteen shillings and nine pence, out of the poors' rate of such township; and another order upon the officers of Eastoft, commanding them to pay the said sum of thirty-four pounds sixteen shillings and six pence, out of the poors' rate of the said township; and another order upon the officers of Holdenby, commanding them to pay the said sum of sixteen pounds three shillings and six pence, out of the poors' rate of such township; which said several orders such justice of the peace is hereby required and enjoined to make, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in him by the before-recited Act; and the said parish officers, guardians of the poor, or district churchwardens, are hereby ordered and commanded to pay such several sums of money in obedience to the order of such justice, in the manner therein directed, or they will incur the penalties consequent upon disobedience to such before-recited Act, and to the present Order:

And the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council (of whom the Lord President of the Council is one) do hereby declare, that for all acts, deeds, matters, and things properly done by such Board of Health, justice of the peace, overseers, churchwardens, guardians of the poor, and others His Majesty's subjects, in execution and furtherance of this present Order of the Lords and others in Council, or of any order so to be made by any such justice as aforesaid, this Order shall be their full and sufficient warrant.

THE following Address to the King, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Viscount Melbourne, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, the Inhabitants of the town of Kelso and its vicinity, in public meeting assembled, beg leave most humbly, but sincerely, to offer to your Majesty the renewed assurances of our loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

The recent adoption of resolutions by the House of Commons, that immediate and effectual measures shall be taken for the entire abolition of slavery, under such provisions for regulating the condition of the negroes as may combine their welfare with the interests of the proprietors, is a measure of such a nature as prompts us to approach your Majesty's Throne with the warm and united expression of our congratulation on an occasion so auspicious to the interests of humanity. We regard this determination of the Representatives of the People as indeed one of the first and best fruits of parliamentary reform; and when the good work shall be consummated, as we confidently trust it will be by the wisdom of Parliament, it will shed a lustre on your Majesty's reign that has never been surpassed; and the event will descend to after ages as one of the purest and brightest in the history of our country.

We beg leave also most humbly to express our gratitude to your Majesty for having adopted that line of policy which your Majesty has so wisely and justly pursued with regard to the civil war now carried on in Portugal; and we venture to express to your Majesty our unabated confidence in the talents and integrity of your present Ministers, and our conviction that in conducting the affairs of this great empire, they are actuated by an earnest desire to promote its best interests, and are animated by an ardent zeal for upholding the true dignity of the Crown and the constitutional rights and liberties of the people.
