

His Majesty in Council, and enrolled in the Court of Chancery, according to the provisions of the said Act:

And whereas it appears expedient to the said Commissioners, that a further general rule should be drawn up and framed for the purpose of providing for the payment, to a certain amount, of the compensation monies which may be adjudged to belong to, or vested in, persons labouring under certain disabilities:

Now, therefore, we, the undersigned Commissioners, have accordingly drawn up and framed the following

RULE:

That in all cases in which any compensation monies, not exceeding the sum of two hundred pounds sterling, shall be adjudged by the Commissioners to belong to, or be vested in, any infants or lunatics, such monies shall be paid to his, her, or their natural or other guardian or guardians, committee or committees, to and for the use and benefit of such infants or lunatics so entitled thereto respectively.

The following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, having been transmitted by Robert Montgomerie Lord Belhaven, His Majesty's Commissioner, to the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

May it please your Majesty,

THE gracious Letter with which your Majesty has honoured this meeting of the General Assembly of our National Church has been received by us with profound respect and gratitude.

We feel highly gratified and encouraged by your Majesty's condescending expression of satisfaction with our loyalty and attachment to your Royal Person, and our zeal for the maintenance of true religion and sound morality; and we beg leave to assure your Majesty, that it shall be our earnest endeavour to continue to merit your royal approbation and favour.

In all our proceedings we shall study to maintain

a policy founded on the principles of pure and undefiled religion, and a spirit of Christian moderation, wisdom, and charity.

We desire to express our gratitude for the assurance which your Majesty has given, that the Church of Scotland shall receive the constant protection of your Majesty and be secured in all its rights and privileges.

Having had ample experience of the eminent qualifications of the Right Honourable Lord Belhaven for executing the important trust committed to his charge in former General Assemblies as your Majesty's representative, we beg leave to assure your Majesty, that the re-appointment of that Nobleman as your Majesty's High Commissioner is most acceptable to the Ministers and Elders of our National Church.

We receive with thankfulness your Majesty's munificent donation of two thousand pounds, for the propagation of Christian knowledge in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, and it shall be our endeavour to apply it faithfully and prudently to the pious purposes contemplated by your Majesty.

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, may bless your Majesty, your Royal Consort the Queen, and every Member of your Royal House, with every temporal and spiritual blessing, that he may prolong your days, that he may prosper your Government, and that, after a happy and peaceful reign, you may receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away, are the fervent prayers of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most loyal, and most obedient subjects, the Ministers and Elders of this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.
