His royal licence and authority, that he, having intermarried with Dame Mary Martin Ormsby Rebow, widow of Sir Thomas Ormsby, of Cloghans, in the county of Mayo, Bart. deceased, and only daughter and heir of Francis Slater Rebow, of Wivenhoe-park, in the county of Essex, Esq. a Lieutenant-General in the Army, may (in compliance with the wish of his said father in law) henceforth take and use the surname of Rebow, in addition to and after that of Gurdon, and also bear the arms of Rebow; and that the said surname and arms of Rebow may be in like manner used and borne by the issue of his marriage; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:
