or the Left with two others; We enlarged the two Lodgnichts on the Counterfearp, and wasked to make a Communication between them: The Enemy prang a Mine under the Lodgment on the Left, but it had no other effect than to frighten our workmen, who re-established themselves there two hours after, notwithstanding the continual fire of the Enemy; The 24th about fix in the morning the Enemy came out, as if they intended to make a Sally, but our men marching towards them they prefently retired again; one of our Bombs fell into their Half Moon and fet fire to 2 or 3000 Grenadoes, which occasioned a great disorder: This night the Sieur de Valorge, Captain of Grenadiers, and the Sieur Darchert, Captain of Fusiliers, with two or three other Offisers, an Ingenier and 11 or 12 Soldiers were killed, and about 50 Avounded; and Mr. Howard. Son to the Earl of Carille, who came a Volantier to the Siege, was mortally wounded, being lamented by all that know him: The 24th two Deferters that came out of the Town assured us, that the befieged had had fince the figge 600 men killed and wounded. 25th, 26th, and 27th we continued our Works, prepared our Mines, and dilpoled things in order to attack a Horn-work which covers the Baltion of Barlemont. The 28th in the morning 300 Grenadicrs and 500 Mulqueteers were detached to make the faid attack, being supported by the Regiment of Vaubencourt; the Mines being forung, they made a very great breach, and the Earth which they threw into the Dirch gave our men the means of mounting the breach very eafily; The Grenadiers having mounted it, began to lodge themselves, notwithstanding the Enemy fired very thick upon them; Those that advanced towards the Courtin that joyns the Baltion on the left, met with great reslittance; Four Companies of the Spanish Regiment in Garison in the place, defended the Breath for above an hour with great oblinacy, but our men arracked them with so much vigor that most of them were cut in pieces; Some Horse of the place advancing at the same time into the Dirch, were overthrown, and the Officer that commanded them, was killed by the Count de Mailly; And after a very oblinate i ight our men made a lodgment on the faid Hornwork capable to receive 1000 men, an I possessed themselves of all the Countermines, and ways of Communication: In this attack several Persons of Quality and Officers were killed and wounded, and between 3 and 400 soldiers: Among the first were the Duke de Choiseul and the Vidame of Laon, Son to the Count de Roye, who were dangeroully wounded; the Marquis de Eourlemont d'Anglure, Brother to the Duke d'Airi, who was killed. And the Prince de la Roche Sur Yon d'Atri, who was killed. who was lightly wounded with a Stone.

Valenciennes, June 2.
