St. James's-Palace, August 20, 1836.

THIS day His Majesty proceeded in state from St. James's-Palace to the House of Peers, where he arrived about two o'clock; and was received, on alighting from his state coach, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Earl of Denbigh, acting as Deputy Lord Great Chamberlain, in the absence of the Marquess of Cholmondeley, the Earl Marshal, the Lord Steward of the Household, the Lord Viscount Melbourne, Clarenceux King of Arms, in the absence of Garter, and the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner.

His Majesty was there robed, and having put on the imperial crown, the procession moved into the House in the usual order;—the sword of state was borne by the Lord Viscount Melbourne, and the cap of maintenance by the Earl of Shaftesbury, in the absence of the Marquess of Winchester.

His Majesty being seated on the Throne, the Great Officers of State and others standing on the right and left, Sir Augustus Clifford, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a

message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

THE state of the public business enables Me at length to relieve you from further attendance in Parliament; and, in terminating your labours, I have again to acknowledge the zeal with which you have applied yourselves to the public business, and the attention which you have bestowed upon the important subjects which I brought under your consideration at the opening of the session.

The assurances of friendly dispositions which I receive from all Foreign Powers enable Me to congratulate you upon the prospect that peace will continue undisturbed.

I lament deeply that the internal state of Spain still renders that country the only exception to the general tranquillity of Europe; and I regret that the hopes which have been entertained of the termination of the civil war have not hitherto been realised. In fulfilment of the engagements which I contracted by the Treaty of Quadruple Alliance I have afforded to the Queen of Spain the co-operation of a part of My naval force, and I continue to look with unabated solicitude to the restoration of that internal peace

Spain which was one of the main objects of the Quadruple Treaty, and which is so essential to the interests of all Europe.

I am happy to be able to inform you that my endeavours to remove the misunderstanding which had arisen between France and the United States, have been crowned with complete success. The good offices which for that purpose I tendered to the two Governments were accepted by both in the most frank and conciliatory spirit; and the relations of friendship have been re-established between them in a manner satisfactory and honourable to both parties. I trust that this circumstance will tend to draw still closer the ties which connect this country with two great and friendly nations.

I have regarded with interest your deliberations upon the reports of the Commission appointed to consider the state of the dioceses in England and Wales, and I have cheerfully given My assent to the measures which have been presented to Me for carrying into effect some of their most important recommendations,

It is with no ordinary satisfaction that I have learned that you have, with great labour, brought to maturity enactments upon the difficult subject of tithes in England and Wales, which will, I trust, prove in their operation equitable to all the interests concerned, and generally beneficial in their results.

The passing of the Acts for civil registration and for marriages in England has afforded Me much satisfaction. Their provisions have been framed upon those large principles of religious freedom, which, with a due regard to the welfare of the Established Church in this country, I have always been desirous of maintaining and promoting; and they will also conduce to the greater certainty of titles, and to the stability of property.

It has been to Me a source of the most lively gratification to observe the tranquillity which has prevailed, and the diminution of crime which has lately taken place, in Ireland. I trust that perseverance in a just and impartial system of government will encourage this good disposition, and enable that country to develop her great natural resources.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the liberality with which you have voted, not only the ordinary supplies of the year, but

the additional sums required to provide for an increase in My naval force.

I am also gratified to perceive that you have made provision for the full amount of the compensation awarded to the owners of slaves in My colonial possessions, and that the obligations entered into by the Legislature have thus been strictly fulfilled.

The increased productiveness of the public revenue has enabled you to meet these charges, and at the same time to repeal or reduce taxes, of which some were injurious in their effects upon My people, and others unequal in their pressure upon various parts of My dominions abroad.

The present condition of manufactures and commerce affords a subject of congratulation, provided the activity which prevails be guided by that caution and prudence which experience has proved to be necessary to stable prosperity.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The advanced period of the year, and the length of time during which you have been engaged in public affairs, must render you desirous of returning to your respective counties. You will there resume those duties which are in importance inferior only to your legislative functions; and your influence and example will greatly conduce to the maintenance of tranquillity, the encouragement of industry, and the confirmation of those moral and religious habits and principles which are essential to the well-being of every community.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's command, said:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

It is His Majesty's royal will and pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the twentieth day of October next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the twentieth day of October next.

desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for continuing and making perpetual, the duty on certain offices and pensions.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent and other expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ireland; and to grant allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern officers, adjutants, paymasters, quartermasters, surgeons, assistant-surgeons, surgeons' mates, and serjeant-majors of the militia, until the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven.

An Act to amend an Act, for enabling His Majesty to carry into effect a Convention made between His Majesty, the King of the French, the Emperor of All the Russias, and the King of Bavaria.

An Act to regulate parochial assessments.

An Act to suspend, until the sixth day of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, proceedings for recovering payment of the money advanced under the Acts for establishing tithes compositions in Ireland.

An Act to repeal two Acts, of the reign of King George the Second, for the recovery of small debts within the city and liberty of Westminster, and for granting more effectual powers for that purpose.

An Act for making and maintaining a turnpike road from Anniesland Toll-bar to Saint George's-road, and branch roads therewith connected, all in the county of Lanark.

Acts received the Royal Assent, August 20, 1836.

NEWSPAPERS.

United Kingdom.

PRINTED newspapers liable to the stamp duty, and duly stamped, which have passed, or which are to pass, by the General Post within the United Kingdom, will be delivered free of all charge, being no longer subject to penny or two-penny post rates, as heretofore.

Newspapers not having passed, or to pass, through the General Post, but which are put into, and delivered through, the penny or two-penny post of any city, town, or place, will be charged one penny each on delivery.

British Colonies and Possessions.

Printed newspapers, duly stamped, addressed to any of His Majesty's colonies and possessions beyond seas, sent by His Majesty's packets, will be forwarded free of charge; if to be sent by private ships, a postage of one penny each must be paid on putting them into a post-office.

Newspapers sent to India, the Cape of Good Hope, New South Wales, &c. will no longer be charged by weight, but one penny each.

Newspapers printed in the British colonies and possessions, brought to the United Kingdom by His

Majesty's packets, will be delivered free of charge; if brought by private ships, they will be charged one penny each on delivery.

Newspapers may be sent from one British colony to another, *via* the United Kingdom, by His Majesty's packets, free of postage.

Foreign Parts.

Printed newspapers, duly stamped, addressed to the under-mentioned countries and places, may be forwarded by His Majesty's packets, free of charge, *viz.*

Denmark.	Carthagena.
Greece.	Bogota.
Corfu and Ionian Islands.	Hayti or St. Domingo.

If sent by private ships, one penny each must be paid on putting them into a post-office.

Newspapers published in any of the afore-named countries and places, and brought by His Majesty's packets, will be delivered free of charge, except those from France, which are liable to one half-penny each on delivery; if brought by private ships, they will be charged one penny each.

Printed newspapers, duly stamped, and sent by His Majesty's packets, or by private ships, to other foreign countries and places, not enumerated in the preceding list, must be charged two pence each when put into the post. Newspapers from such countries, brought into the United Kingdom by His Majesty's packets, or by private ships, will be charged two pence each upon delivery.

Newspapers intended to be sent either to the British colonies and possessions, or to foreign parts, must be put into the post within seven days after the day on which they were published; and foreign newspapers must be printed in the language of the country from which they have been forwarded. On failure of either of these provisions, they will be charged as letters.

If the person to whom a newspaper from the British colonies, or from foreign parts, is directed shall have removed from the place to which such newspaper shall be addressed, prior to the delivery thereof at the place of its address, it may (provided it has not been opened or used, but not otherwise) be re-directed and forwarded to such person, at any other place within the United Kingdom, free of any additional charge; but if it shall have been opened or used, it will, on re-direction, be charged with the rate of a single letter from the place at which it shall have been re-directed or re-posted, to the place where delivered.

General Regulations.

All newspapers forwarded by post must be sent without covers, or in covers open at the sides; they are otherwise chargeable with postage as letters.

Newspapers, British or foreign, containing any letter, paper, or thing enclosed, or with any writing or marks of reference or information whatever upon them, or upon the covers, other than the address,

will be charged with treble the duty of letter postage.

Postmasters are authorised and required to examine and search all newspapers, to protect the revenue from fraud; and the Postmaster-General is empowered by the Act of Parliament, to proceed against parties attempting any frauds upon the revenue through the medium of newspapers.
