

will march with his Forces for Hungary, or at least that he will send thither the greatest part of them. From *Lintz* they write, that the Imperial Army was marching towards *Pest*, to make use of the great Consternation that is among the Turks, and that having made themselves Masters of that place, the Duke of *Lorraine* would again pass the *Danube* and besiege *Buda*; There is a report that Count *Lesly* hath burnt the Bridge of *Esseck*, having with him of Germans and Croats a Body of 15 or 16000 men, but it needs a Confirmation. The Fortifications of *Trier* being demolished, it's said the *Marschal de Crequi* is returned to *Nancy*.

Brussels, July 14. The French Army continues encamped at *Leffines*; and the Spanish Cavalry near this City. The *Seur de Chanlay* is expected here again, when the Courier he hath sent to *Versailles*, is come back, to settle the Contributions and to a just matters concerning a Cessation of Hostilities. The Letters come in this day from *Germany* confirm the account we gave you in our last of the great Victory which the Duke of *Lorraine* obtained the 27th of the last month against the Turks near *Vaccia*, for which *Te Deum* was intended to be sung here this day, but the Marquis de *Grana* being taken ill with a Fit of the Cholick, it is deferred till Sunday. The Duke of *Haire* received by the last Spanish Ordinary a Commission to be Sergeant General of Battails, with an appointment of 500 Crowns a month as Grandee of *Spain*, and 300 more as General of Battalia. We hear that the Elector of *Cologne's* Troops are moving; and that the Troops of *Munster* and *Brandenburg* do likewise march towards the *Rhin*. We are told from *Liege*, that things are there in much disorder again, upon the old difference between the Magistrates and the Burghers.

Brussels, July 18. On Sunday last very early in the Morning, the French Army decamped from *Leffines*: The *Marschal de Schomberg* (who we hear is since gone for *Paris*) marched with the Foot and the Artillery to *Tournay*; and greatest part of the Horse took their march towards the *Meuse*. We have advice that the *Marschal de Crequi* hath likewise separated his Army; himself with part of it being retired to *Metz*; and the other Troops being marched towards *Alsace*. Sunday in the Evening Monsieur *Chanlay* returned hither, and had yesterday in the Morning and in the Afternoon long Conferences with his Excellency (though he was in his Bed) and we are told that they have settled the matter of the Contributions. From *Germany* they write, that the Troops of *Bavaria*, *Hesse Cassell*, and *Franconia*, which were marching towards the *Rhin*, have been countermanded; and that it was believed these Troops will be sent for *Hungary* to joyn the Imperial Army. We have an account by Letters from *Lintz* which arrived this Morning, that the Duke of *Lorraine* has taken *Pest* without any opposition the Turks having upon the approach of the Christians abandoned and set Fire to it, but the Imperialists followed them so close, that they entered the Town at the same time that the Enemy quitted it, and overcome the Fire before it had done any great harm; In the mean time the Janisaries who had the guard of the Bridge, to secure their retreat, set Fire to it, but the Christians pressed so hard upon them, that they were forced to retire before they had ruined the Bridge, however they made it for the present useless to the Imperialists; And that the Duke of *Lorraine* did employ the Prisoners he took at *Vaccia* with a considerable number of his Soldiers to fortifie *Pest*; and had caused a Bridge of Boats to be laid over the *Danube*, which he intended to pass and to besiege *Buda*.

Durham, July 8. Yesterday the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of this City (according to a Vote lately passed unanimously for surrendering up their Charter into the hands of the Lord Bishop of *Durham*) did attend his Lordship at his Palace in *Aukland* (8 Miles distant from hence) and there made an actual surrender of the same; which was accepted with great respect, the Lord Bishop promising them, that upon many years experience, he was well assured of their Loyalty, and therefore could willingly restore their Charter again entire, without the least alteration. but to secure it for the future, his Lordship was pleased to grant a new Charter, reserving only to himself and his Successors in this See, the Power of approving and confirming the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common-Council, so often as they should be elected. Afterwards they were all very kindly entertained at Dinner, and went away abundantly satisfied.

Hampton-Court, July 11. The Right Honorable the Earl of *Murray* and the Earl of *Middleton*, His Majesty's Secretaries of State for the Kingdom of *Scotland*, were this day by His Majesty's command, Sworn of His most Honorable Privy Council here, and accordingly took their Places at the Board.
