Heir at Law and Next of Kin of Thomas Edden, late of Blackwell, in the parish of Tredington, in the county of Worcester, Gentleman, deceased.

WHEREAS by a Decree of the High Court of Chancery, made in a cause of Fardon versus Hartwell, it is referred to Sir Giffin Wilson, one of the Masters of the Court, to

PURSUANT to a Decree of the High Court of Chancery, made in a cause Blease versus Burgh, all persons claiming to be the next of kin of Alice Savignac, Widow, living at the time of her death (which happened on the 16th day of August 1805), or to be the personal representative or representatives of any of such next of kin who have since died, are, on or before the 12th day of March 1837, to come in and make out their kindred and claims before the Right Honourable Robert Lord Henley, one of the Masters of the said Court, at his chambers, in Southampton-buildings, Chancery-lane, London, or in default thereof they will be excluded the benefit of the said Decree.
