

said districts respectively, and for enabling the spiritual person serving the said chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district attached to the said chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendance of the said district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named the Christ Church District, with boundaries as follows:

The boundary to commence at the corner of Oak-road, opposite to the end of Hargate-lane, in the great turnpike road leading from Dudley to Birmingham; and thence proceed, in a north west direction, along and including the left or south side of the said turnpike road to Great Bridge, where the parish of Tipton joins the parish of West Bromwich; then, in a south west direction, along the borders of Tipton to where the parishes of Tipton and Rowley Regis meet, upon the boundary of West Bromwich; then, southward, along the borders of Rowley Regis to where Oldbury, in the parish of Hales Owen, and the parish of Rowley Regis meet, on the boundary of West Bromwich; thence, in a south east and easterly direction, along the borders of Oldbury, crossing Bromford-lane, and continuing in the same direction to where Smethwick, in the parish of Harborne, and Oldbury meet, on the borders of West Bromwich; then, eastward, along the borders of Smethwick to that part near the Birmingham Canal where the boundary takes a north east direction; continuing along the said boundary to Roebuck-lane, then crossing Roebuck-lane, in an easterly direction, through Sandwell-coppice, and passing at the back of Street House, late in the occupation of Joseph Halford, Esq. but now of Henry Halford, Esq. across the road into the meadow, opposite to where the parishes of Handsworth and Smethwick meet, on the boundary of West Bromwich; then, across the turnpike road to the corner of Park-wall, continuing, northward, along the borders of Handsworth parish to Sandwell lodge gate; and then westward, through Sandwell-park, in front of the Hall, the seat of the Right Honourable the Earl of Dartmouth, into the road leading from Mares-green to West Bromwich Old Church; thence, southward, to the end of Taylor's-lane; then, in a westerly direction, along and including the left or south side of Taylor's-lane and Sandwell-road into Hargate-lane; and then, in a south west direction, along and including the left or south east side of Hargate-lane to the corner of the Oak-road, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan annexed to the said representation, and therein coloured pink:

That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of His Majesty King George the Third, and in testimony of such his approbation the said Lord Bishop has put his signature and seal at the foot of the said representation; and humbly praying, that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to His Majesty shall seem meet:

His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
