WE, the undersigned British residents in the city and vicinity of St. Petersburgh, in the empire of Russia, venture to approach your Majesty, to present our humble and loyal address of congratulation on

your Majesty's Coronation.

Although dwelling in a foreign land, our hearts beat in unison with those of our fellow-countrymen at home; and actuated by the liveliest feelings of Ioyalty and devotion to your Majesty, of attachment to our country, and veneration for its constitution, we ardently participate in the sentiments which have been universally expressed on the occasion of the august solemnity of the 28th of June, when your Majesty, by a public investiture, sanctioned by the sacred ordinances of religion, assumed the Crown of your Illustrious Ancestors.
