

his Journey for *Liege* the 4th of the next Month, for which the necessary preparations are making in the mean time. We are told that his Electoral Highness has offered to assist the Emperor with 6000 Men against the Turks; and to maintain them, and that the States of the Circle of *Westphalia* will add to them 4000 Men of their Troops, upon condition the Emperor pay them while they are in his service.

*Brussels, Sept. 26.* The matter of the Contributions is finally settled; and the French Troops have orders to retire out of these Territories; Monsieur de la *Trouffe* who was encamped at *Deynse* has taken his march towards *Courtray*, from whence he will pass into the French Conquest: Monsieur de *Boufflers* who had his Camp at *Gaure* in the Countrey of *Alost*, marched yesterday towards *Pont Esperies* to pass the *Schelde* there, and enter into the *Chastellenie* of *Tournay*; and Monsieur de *Foyeuse*, who was advanced with the Troops under his Command to *Tillemont* decamped likewise yesterday from thence and marched towards *Nivelles*. Our last Letters from *Vienna* gave us an account, that the *Seraskier* Bassa who was marching to the relief of *Buda*, understanding that the Bavarian Forces were arrived in the Imperial Camp, and that the Convoy he had sent to *Alba Regalis* was taken by the Christians, had changed his resolution, and was retiring again to repass the Bridge of *Essecke*, leaving the besieged in *Buda* to make the best conditions they could for themselves, so that we may expect to have in a day or two an account that the place is surrendered. The same Letters add that the King of *Poland* after the taking of *Jaslowie*, was marched with his whole Army to oblige the *Transylvanians* to declare against the Turks.

*Brussels, September 29.* Monsieur de *Foyeuse*, who decamped on Monday last from *Tillemont* and lodged that night near *Waur*, hath made a halt for a day or two at *Nivelles*, from whence he intended to march this morning to *Bucks*, and so to *Mabeuge*; Monsieur de *Boufflers* and Monsieur de la *Trouffe* are likewise on their march; And we are assured that by Sunday next all the French Troops will have quitted the Spanish Territories. Our Letters from *Vienna* of the 17th Instant inform us, that General *Rabata* arrived there the 13th from the Army, and reported that the Turks in *Buda* continued to make a very good defence upon the assurance they had that the *Seraskier* Bassa had received positive Orders to relieve them, and that he was accordingly on his march with an Army of 40000 men; but it was not doubted the place would be in the hands of the Christians before the Turks could attempt its relief. That the Emperor had on the 17th received Letters from the Duke of *Lorraine*, wherein he tells his Imperial Majesty he hoped to be Master of the place in three or four days; That the Attacks towards the River were so far advanced, and such great breaches made, that they were resolved to a general Assault; And that from the account they had from Prisoners and Deserters of the condition of the Besieged, they had reason to believe they would not suffer things to come to extremities; The Letters farther add, that a Courier was arrived from *Poland* with advice, that the King having sent out the Treasurer of the Crown with a great detachment to attack the Hospodar of *Wallachia*, established by the Turks, he had given the said Hospodar an entire defeat, and had taken all his Baggage and Artillery; and that the Turks and Tartars, who were with the Hospodar were retired to the *Danube*, and had laid a Bridge over that River to repass it, in case they were pursued.

*Hague, Septemb. 29.* The Deputies of the States-General and those of the *East-India* Company have had several Conferences together, in relation to the Deputation the States are sending for *England*, concerning the affair of *Bantam*. Lieutenant-Admiral *Tromp* lies dangerously ill. From *Hamburg* they write, that the Conferences at *Itzeboe* are like to have a very good effect for the establishing a perfect friendship and good correspondence between the King of *Denmark*, the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Prince of *Lunenbourg*.

*Paris, September 30.* The 24th Instant the Court arrived at *Chambor*, where they will stay 10 days or a fortnight, and then return to pass the Winter at *St. Germain*. The Duke of *Orleans* is pretty well again, his Ague having left him. The French Troops are retiring out of *Flanders*; And the Marshal d' *Humieres* has given Orders for the demolishing the Fortifications of *Courtray* and *Dixmuyde*, in order to the restoring those places to the King of *Spain*. It is reported that the French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies is again before *Genoua*.
