"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Salisbury has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, in testimony of which, the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the before-mentioned circumstances, and humbly to pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division and assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
