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Warsaw, September 11.

Our Letters from *Leopol* inform us, That the Queen of *Poland* (who had taken her leave of the King at a small place two miles beyond *Slozorow*) was returned thither. That the King marched with the whole Army, which General *Mohila* joyned the second Instant with 15000 Cossacks towards *Caminec*; but that it was believed his Majesties intention therein was only to amuse the Enemy; who were in a Body near *Cecora*, having been lately reinforced with 10 or 12000 Tartars under the command of the Son of the Kam, which was so small a number in comparison of what the Turks expected, that they were greatly dissatisfied with the said Kam, whom his Son endeavored to excuse, by saying he had at this time need of his Forces at home as well for his own security, the old Kam, who was deposed by the Grand Signior having a strong Party that waited for an opportunity to restore him, as to cover his Country against the Incursions of the Cossacks *Zaporoviens*. The King hath commanded publick Prayers to be made throughout this Kingdom for the Prosperity of his Arms and those of the Princes engaged with him in this War.

Florence, September 19. The French Fleet have been again before *Genoua*, which did not a little alarm that City, the Inhabitants in much disorder removing their Goods to the Mountains; but the Weather was so bad that the Ships could not ride at their Anchors, and were forced to put to Sea. The Senate of *Genoua* have, we hear, sent to the Governor of *Milan* to desire he will assist them with 2000 Foot and 500 Horse; and have dispatched a Felucca with Letters to the General of the Spanish Gallies pressing their speedy return to *Genoua*; They have sent 500 Men to *Porto Specia* under the command of a Senator to secure that place; and have confirmed their present Magistrates for another year not to lose time in a new Election.

Venice, September 23. On Sunday last arrived here a Vessel from *Corfu*, bringing Letters from Captain General *Morosini*, wherein, as we are informed, he gives the Senate an account, That he had taken his Course with the Fleet of this State towards the Gulf of *Lepanto*, and that some of the Ships and Gallies having entered into the Port of *Canaila*, they had made a descent, and had furnished the whole Fleet with fresh Provisions; That he did design to pass into the *Archipelago* to joyn General *Molino*, but that he feared the Sea-loa was too far advanced; And the Popes Gallies and those of *Tuscany* were unwilling to stay abroad longer then the next Month.

Vienna, September 24. On Thursday last the Adjutant-General *Haslinger* came hither Post from

the Camp before *Buda*; by whom we are told, that the Serasquier Bassa was arrived with the Army under his command near *Alba Regalia*, but had not yet made any attempt towards the relieving of *Buda*; That they had had a warm alarm in the Camp upon advice that the Enemy advanced towards them; and that the Duke of *Lorraine* had thereupon marched with the Horse and Dragoons to fight them; but the Turks did not stir out of their Camp; and his Highness leaving 10000 Horse under the command of Prince *Louis* of *Baden* to have an Eye upon the Enemies motions, returned to the Army. That the Cavalry of the Elector of *Bavaria* were not yet arrived in the Imperial Camp; but that they were expected there the 21, with the Imperial Regiments of *Caraffa*, *Cheville* and *Herbeville*, which came from *Bohemia*, and *Moravia*, where they had their Quarters; That in the mean time the Siege was continued with great vigor; the Troops of *Bavaria* being advanced to the Walls of the Castle wherein they have made great breaches; That the Besieged make frequent Sallies upon them, but with little success, and ply them very close with Grenadoes and other artificial Fire, which they throw into their Trenches, but without any great effect, for that the Besiegers cover themselves with Gabions and Sacks of Wool; The Besieged likewise have made several Retrenchments behind the Breaches, and seem resolved to expect the Extremity; but notwithstanding all their resolution it's not doubted but the Christians will be Masters of the place before the end of this Month. On Tuesday last arrived here 2000 Men of the Troops of the Circle of *Suabia*, who the next day parted again for *Hungary*; And this morning arrived here by Water 2500 Men more of the said Circle, who came ashore to refresh themselves, and in the Evening embarked again; and in two or three days they will have joyned the Imperial Army.

Hamburg, September 29. The Meeting at *Itzeboe* is at present separated; The Heer *Meinders*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Heer *de Groot*, who was there in the same Quality from the Duke of *Hanover*, being gone home to give the Princes their Masters an account of what hath passed in this Conference, and to receive their farther Instructions thereupon, intending to be back at *Itzeboe* in few days. Two thousand Men of the King of *Denmark's* Troops, that were quartered in the Dutchy of *Holstein*, are marched to *Kjel* to embark there for *Copenhagen*. From *Berlin* they write, that the Conference was begun between the Swedish and *Brandenburg* Commissioners for the adjusting the Limits in *Pomerania*. And from *Dresden* we have an account, that the Troops which the Elector of *Saxony* was sending for *Hungary*, have been countermanded, for that they could not arrive there time enough to do any this Campaigne.

Frankfort, October 1. Our last advices from the Imperial Army before *Buda*, by the Duke of *Lorraine*, who went on the 16th past with his Horse and Dragoons to meet and fight the Seraskier *Bassa* was returned to the Camp, having understood that the Enemy had posted themselves very advantageously near *Alba Regalis*. The Besiegers carry on their Attacks with very good success; and have made a very large breach in the Wall of the Castle; Besides the Turks begin to want Bread, and the Officers can hardly keep up the Courage of the Garrison, who think they have done enough in defending the Place so long, and that it is now time to provide for themselves by a Capitulation.

Cologne, Oct. 3. The Elector of *Cologne* parted the first Instant from *Bon* accompanied with above 200 Persons of Quality of this Diocese, *Munster* and *Hildesheim*; Yesterday his Electoral Highness arrived at *Berckem*, where he was very magnificently entertained by the Duke of *Fuliers*, and this night his Electoral Highness intended to lie at *Kislet*, where he will stay two or three days before he make his publick Entry into *Liege*. We expect every hour the news of the Surrender of *Buda*, which cannot hold out much longer, it lying in a manner open by the great breaches the Besiegers have made, and all things, according to our last advices, being ready for a general Assault, which the Elector of *Bavaria* and the Duke of *Lorraine* had resolved to make the 25th or 26th of the last Month, if the place was not Surrendered before; as for the Seraskier *Bassa*, he was not in a condition to give the Besiegers any great disturbance.

Hague, October 3. The Members of the States of *Holland* and *West-Friseland* are most of them come hither to re-assemble to morrow; But they will not continue above a day or two together, and then adjourn till the beginning of the next Month. We have an account from *Liege* that the Burghermaster *Plenevaux*, who was imprisoned with the two other Burghermasters *Renardi* and *Macors*, upon the reducing that City to the Obedience of the Elector of *Cologne*, their Prince, hath made his escape; which made the other two be more strictly guarded; The Burghermaster *Renardi* hath been put to the Question; and the Goods of the *Sieur Plenevaux* have been confiscated.

Brussels, October 6. The French Troops have entirely quitted these Countries; The Contributions are to be paid in eight months; Monsieur de *Choiseul* hath sent back the Hostages of this Province; and to morrow the Truce will be proclaimed here. Our Letters from the Camp before *Buda* of the 18th and 19th past, and of the 24th from *Vienne*, give an account, that the Duke of *Lorraine*, having marched with his Horse and Dragoons to fight the Seraskier *Bassa*, who he was informed advanced to attempt the relief of *Buda*, found the Enemy very strongly posted with a River before them near *Alba Regalis*; They kept very close in their Camp, and his Highness did not think fit to attack him with so much disadvantage; and therefore leaving the Prince of *Raden* with 10000 Horse to observe their motions, he returned with the rest of the Troops to the Camp before *Buda* to push on the Siege. That the Besieged continued to make a very stout defence, being encouraged with the hopes of relief; but that the Christians were advanced so far, and such large breaches made, that in few days a general Assault would be given if the Besieged did not Capitulate before. We have likewise advice, That General *Schultz*, who commands the Emperor's Forces in *Upper-Hungary*, having notice

that Count *Teckley* had put 150 Men with two Pieces of Cannon into *Zeben*, a small place towards the Mountains not far from *Esperies*, he marched thither, and took it, greatest part of the Garrison being put to the Sword in revenge of what *Teckley* lately did upon the taking a small Castle from the Imperialists.

Paris, Oct. 7. On Thursday last the Truce with the Emperor and the Empire, and the King of Spain, was published here with the usual Ceremonies; And in the Evening there were Bonfires in all the principal Streets of the City. The King has given Orders for the Disbanding 20000 Foot and 14000 Horse, which are to be put in execution before the 10th of this Month. The news we had here the last week of the taking *Buda*, is not confirmed.

London, September 30. His Majesty having by Commission under the Great Seal, appointed Sir *William Goslin* and Sir *Peter Vandeput* to be Sheriffs for this City and County of *Middlesex* for the Year ensuing; They according to Custom entered upon their Office the 28th Instant, having been Sworn in the usual manner before the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen at the *Guild-Hall*. And this day the Lord Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen of this City went with the new Sheriffs by Water to *Westminster*, and presented them to the Barons of the *Exchequer*; where the old Sheriffs Sir *Peter Dainel* and Sir *Samuel Dashwood* having sworn to their Accounts, and the usual Services being performed, they returned in the same manner; And the Lord Mayor, Recorder, and the Aldermen, were afterwards, together with the Officers of the *Exchequer*, Entertained by the present Sheriffs at a very Noble Dinner at *Haberdashers-Hall*.
