A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have been given to understand that, in some parts of Our United Kingdom, persons have of late unlawfully assembled together, for the purpose of training or drilling persons to the use of arms, or of being trained or drilled, or for the purpose of practising military exercise, movements, or evolutions; and whereas such assemblies and proceedings are prohibited by law, as being dangerous to the peace and security of Our

liege subjects, and of Our authority. And all persons guilty of such offences are punishable by transportation or imprisonment :

We, therefore, being duly sensible of the mischievous consequences likely to arise from such unlawful practices, if suffered to continue unpunished, and being firmly resolved to cause the laws to be put in execution for the punishment of such offenders, have thought fit, by the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby strictly commanding all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and all other civil Officers whatsoever, that they do use their utmost endeavours to discover, apprehend, and bring to justice the persons concerned in the unlawful proceedings above-mentioned :

And whereas in some parts of Our United Kingdom, large numbers of persons have lately assembled and met together, many of them being armed with bludgeons and other offensive weapons, and have, by their exciting to breaches of the peace, and by their riotous proceedings, caused great alarm to Our subjects :

And whereas such meetings are contrary to law and dangerous to the peace of Our realm and to the property and the lives of Our subjects :

We, therefore, hereby strictly command all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and all other civil Officers whatsoever, that they use their utmost endeavours to enforce the law, and prevent, put down, and suppress such unlawful meetings, and bring offenders to justice. And We strictly enjoin all Our liege subjects to give prompt and effectual assistance to Our Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and all civil Officers, in their endeavours to preserve the public peace.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham-Palace, this third day of May, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, and in the second year of Our reign.
