Pendennis, Oct. 2.

ON Sunday in the evening came in hither the *Sorlings* Fregat from the Westwards, where she has been some time Cruising, but springing a leak in the Powder-room, was forced to put in here to stop it. The last evening came in here a *Swede* from *Staadts*, laden with several sorts of goods for the *Caribbe* Islands.

Newcastle, Oct. 4. The ill weather we have lately had has hitherto kept in our laden Fleet. Yesterday came in 17 sail of light ships, and many more are expected as soon as the weather will permit them.

Lyn Oct. 4. On Sunday last a laden Collier belonging to *Southwold*, was driven up into this Bay, and stranded on the *Washway*, the men all of them saved, but the Vessel broken to pieces. We fear the ill news of many Wrecks at Sea, the weather having been of late very tempestuous.

Plymouth, Oct. 4. Yesterday arrived here an *Offender*, bringing in with him a *French* ship of 50 tons, laden with Bank-fish, and taken out of some Port of *France*.

Portsmouth, Oct. 6. Yesterday in the Afternoon Sir *Fevemy Smith* with the Convoy under his protection and nine or ten Fregats, sailed from the *Spirit* head for the *Downes*, leaving behind him the *Dunkerke* and two other of his Fregats to take in Provisions, which will suddenly follow.

Yesterday arrived here a small vessel of 100 tons, a Prize-ship formerly brought into *Guernsey*, and there employed in his Majesty's Service, and has now brought over two Companies of Disbanded Souldiers; in her coming in, she ran much danger in striking upon the *Flats*, from whence in two hours time, by the help of the Flood, she got off again with little damage.

Cadix, Sept. 13. The arrival of the *Quick-silver* Fleet from *New Spain* is very welcome news to all the Spanish Dominions, the Fleet consisting in all of three Ships, two Gallions, and one Merchant Ship, bringing with them in silver and rich commodities, to the value of three millions of pieces of Eight, whereof a considerable portion belonging to particular persons, paying two per cent to his Majesty: The Bars of silver are ordered to be sent away for *Sevil* to be there Minted. In their return they met with a Merchant ship which informed them, that the Gallions in 46 daies after their putting out to Sea from *Cadix*, had got the length of the watering place of *Cuba*, and were supposed to be lost.

A French ship bound from *Venice* to *Lisbonne*, was lately seized by an English Man of War in the Bay of *Lagus*, her lading consisting most of Rice and Steel, with some Bales and Cases of Silk, which are since with the Prize sent into *Tangier*, and thought to be worth near forty thousand pieces of Eight.

Vienna, Sept. 22. The success of his Most Christian Majesty in the *Netherlands* has induced this Court, and generally the whole Empire, to take care for their preservation, to which they are the more encouraged by what the Spanish Ambassado: seems to assure us, viz. of a resolution taken in *Spain* to put the *Netherlands* into the hands and protection of his Imperial Majesty; so as to incorporate them into the Empire, which will oblige us with greater earnestness to endeavour their preservation.

'Tis confidently said, that the Generals of the *Swisse* have by their Deputies offered an Alliance with his Imperial

Majesty, and the King of *Spain*; and to raise their proportions of men, to assist either in *Alsacia* or *Milan* against all Invaders, which his Majesty supposed hath occasioned the resolution of his Imperial Majesty to order three Regiments of *Croats* to march for *Tyrol* to have an eye upon *Alsacia*, where they will be in a readiness to joyn with any other forces that shall be employed for the defence of that Country.

A Courier lately dispatched hither from the *Baron de Geys*, confirms the conclusion of a firm Alliance made between the Electors, Princes and Dukes in the Higher and Lower *Saxony*, who have several Regiments of Souldiers in readiness, and taken order for the raising of a considerable sum of money for their subsistence.

The Council of War has Remonstrated to the Emperour, that it would be convenient for some months to delay the levying of new forces, which by reason of the approaching Winter will be able to do little service, and in the mean while be very expensive to his Imperial Majesty, and a trouble to the Countreys where they must be quartered. In the mean time, the moneys expected from the Hereditary Provinces will be carefully paid in, and some further sums be advanced for the carrying on of the Levies.

The Count de *Wallenstein* was some daies since dispatched to the Elector of *Bavaria*, to acquaint him with the Emperours intentions in relation to the differences between the Dukes of *Savoy* and *Mantua*, and the inconveniencies that may arise from interposing the Crown of *France* in their disputes, or seeking any succours or supplies from thence.

The Directors of the Company of our *Levant* Merchants are encouraged to take care for a fresh supply of Merchandises, to be sent with the first opportunity for *Buda*, their first Venture having turned to a very good account.

Rome, Sept. 27. The affairs of this Court are still at a stand, the Pope resolving upon no business of great importance till the arrival of his Nephew. *Don Camillo* with a great Train of the Popes Kindred are daily expected from *Pistoja*, their Palace is fitting up for their Reception; the Princes, and other persons of greatest Quality, out-vying each other in presenting the richest furnitures for its Ornament.

Here was lately there have been held a Solemn Procession (much desired by the people, but for 12 years intermitted during the Reign of the late Pope *Alexander*) to the Lady of *Loretto*, usually made by those of the Province of *Marcha*, but governed and directed by the Cardinal *Pallotta*, and accordingly a great Machine was prepared to have been drawn by six Oxen, assisted by 80 Porters who were unseen, to have supported it, accompanied by several Musicians habited and dressed up like Angels. This Ceremony was now ready to proceed, the Windows being in all the Streets by which it was to have passed, adorned with Pictures and rich Tapestries, and filled with Spectators, when the Cardinal *Pallotta* being informed that the French Ambassadors servants, privately invited without his direction, stood ready to take the first places and fearing lest the Spaniards being also invited, some contests might arise to the disturbance of the Peace, his Eminency desired the French Ambassador, to avoid all Dispute, to command his Footmen home, and the Spanish Ambassador to forbear sending any of his, but finding this a work of difficulty, and the French Ambassador not to be prevailed with to command his Servants: The Pope being informed of the whole matter, sent his Order to prohibit the Procession, to prevent the disorders which might otherwise have happened.

Venice, Sept. 30. A ship newly arrived from Zante, informs us, that the Turks continue their Assaults upon the Town of Candia with great fury, though but small success, having not yet gained any considerable advantages upon them, that their Army is much lessened, not only by the numbers killed during the Siege, which are very considerable, but by sickness occasioned amongst them by the great want of necessary Provisions in their Camp, which has invited a considerable number of them to steal away, wanting no opportunities that our men can furnish them with, to convey them out of the Island.

Another Vessel arriving here from Lisbon, touched in her way at Zante, confirming the abovesaid relation, informing us also of the safe arrival of the *Marabotto* in that Port, in which were embarked 800 souldiers, and 300 Banditti added to them out of the Island to be employed in the Defence of Candia, and that several other Vessels lay there ready laden with Provisions and Ammunition, which would all sail together with the first fair wind.

Yesterday arrived here a Caich from Dalmatia, who tells us, that General Cornaro is upon his way hither, and may arrive either this day or tomorrow; his Successor Priuli lies ready to put to Sea, the Gally that is to transport him being fitted up to receive him. The Winter is now so near that they are now out of all fear of any Attempts that can be this year made on them by the Turks; however General Cornaro has been very careful to put all places into the best posture of defence imaginable, and has drawn 400 Foot into Cattaro, as an addition to that Garrison, where they are to continue all this Winter. Several Vessels are suddenly to put to Sea from hence, where are to embark some Horse and Foot which are to be employed in Dalmatia.

Four great ships lye ready to set sail, all of them laden with Provisions of War for the supply of Candia.

His Excellency *Grimani*, designed Ambassador from this Republick to Rome, will in few dayes be ready to depart from hence, a Gally attending him for his passage to Ancona, from whence he intends to pass over land.

The Senate was the other night at a scrutiny for the election of another Ambassador to be dispatched to the Emperors Court, but the choice is not as yet made.

On Sunday next will be launched a great ship built upon the account of several private persons, which will carry 60 great guns. Two other large ships that are on the Stocks upon the Publick account, will in short time be finished; Signior Nani chosen General of Candia, is busily providing for his Voyage, and Order is taken for a strong Convoy to be fitted out with all the hast imaginable, to be sent into the Levant.

Hamburg, Oct. 4. The 20th past, the King, Queen and Prince of Denmark, with the young Duke of Saxony and his Lady, together with several other persons of eminent quality, arrived at Altenaw, not far distant from this place, where they were cheerfully received and entertained by the Citizens, who were drawn up in four Companies, discharging several Volleys at their entry, which were presently answered by the great Ordnance on that side of this City; Several English ships which were then newly arrived here, firing also their Guns. The Queen with the two Princesses came privately to see this Town, but unwilling to be known, departed again without any Ceremony.

The 19th past they diverted themselves at Wansbeck, viewing also most of the pleasant Gardens near this place, in most of which they were nobly treated by the Owners, with much satisfaction. Several persons of Quality and Ambassadors are suddenly expected by the King at Gluckstadt, where it is believed he may yet continue for a Month or five Weeks longer.

From Mayence we are told, That his Electoral Highness intends in few dayes for Aschaffenburg, from whence after some little stay, he will pass to Wurtzburg, where he will continue all the Winter. Some progress has been lately made in the examination of the Baron of Reiffenberg whose crimes appear very Enormous. His Highness de-

sires to dispatch some persons of the Great Chapter to examine him farther at Aschaffenburg, and afterwards to proceed to Sentence, which will condemn him to a perpetual Imprisonment.

The Abbot de Gravel continues his residence for the most part in that Electors Court, where is also present the *Sieur de Risseaucour* sent thither from the Duke of Lorraine, with several Envoyes of other Princes.

The Assembly still continues at Cologne, whither the Elector of Mayence has sent also his Deputies.

From Stratsburg we are informed, that the Citizes of Alsatia are freshly anim'd by the Orders lately sent to the Duke de *Magazine* to continue that Government, which before he intended to have quitted, but more at the great preparations making by the French, for sending a powerful Army amongst them.

The Prince de *Sultzback* is lately arrived at Cassell, but upon what design is not said, but he has been observed in a little time since his first being at Cassell, to have visited the Courts of several Princes, having been very lately at Mayence and Dusseldorf.

Tarmouth, Oct. 7. On Saturday last a Fleet consisting of near 40 sail of light Colliers pass'd out of this Road, bound for Sunderland and Newcastle. This evening came into this Road a Fleet from Hull; the ill weather and high winds have much disturbed the Herring Fishing in these Seas.

Lyme, Oct. 7. On Saturday last arrived here three English Vessels laden with Linnea from Morlaix, where the people are generally apprehensive, and talk much of a breach with Holland. Several pieces of ships have been lately driven ashore here since the late tempestuous weather, which makes us fear much the fate of several ships which are waiting in this and our Neighbouring Ports. One Vessel from Barbados, which we feared had miscarried at Sea, is now in view making in for this Harbour.

Weymouth, Oct. 7. The sixth instant arrived here an English Vessel with Linnea from Morlaix, bound for Apfom, having left several Barques behind her, all of them lading for England, to the great satisfaction of the French for the revival of the Trade of the place.

Harwich, Oct. 8. On Sunday towards the evening a Dutch Man of War having aboard her an Ambassador from the States appeared in the Gunfleet, and this morning sent hither for a Pilot to conduct her to the Thames, by the stormy weather she has lost most of her Cables and Anchors. We fear much loss at Sea by Tempest, and hear of some Vessels belonging to Ipswich which are supposed to be cast away.

Whitehall, Oct. 9. Commissioner *Pett* having been twice under Examination before his Majesties most Honourable Privy Council for several great neglects in executing the Orders sent to him, for the safety and preservation of his Majesties ships in the river of Chatham: It was on Monday the seventh instant resolved by his Majesty in Council, that a Commission shall issue out under the Great Seal of England, for a strict enquiry into the whole matter, and for the examination as well of the said Commissioner *Pett*, as of all other persons therein concerned, in order to the farther discovery of the truth of that Fact, and the farther proceeding against such as shall be found guilty of those miscarriages. A Committee of the Board being in the mean time appointed to prepare fit Interrogatories to be proposed to the persons concerned.
