THEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for " rendering more easy the taking the poll at " county elections," it was enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing, that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying, that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition should be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the justices of the peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "Au " Act to settle and determine the division of counties, " and the limits of cities and boroughs, in England

"and Wales, in so far as respects the election of "Members to serve in Parliament," should, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the justices of the peace for the west riding of the county of York, assembled at the quarter sessions for the said riding, holden at Knaresborough on the fifteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and thirtynine, have presented their petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the west riding of the said county is insufficient, and therefore praying, that the town of Gisburn may be a polling place for the said west riding of the said county:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the said Act of the seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct, that the said place mentioned in the said petition, namely, Gisburn, shall be a polling place for the west riding of the said county of York; and further, that the justices of the peace for the said riding, assembled in quarter sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His said late Majesty's reign, shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide

the said west riding of the said county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

Majesty in Council, for the assignment of a chapelry district to St. Paul's Chapel, in the parish of St. Wollos, Newport, in the county of Monmouth, under the 16th section of the 59th George 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Windsor, the 30th of September 1839, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop

of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also of the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes, it is, amongst other things, enacted "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner | words following, viz.

and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or required under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provision of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws to the contrary notwith-standing;" and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third. intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

- "Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong for ten years Her Majesty's Commission for building new churches," beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of St. Wollos, in the county of Monmouth and diocese of Llandaff, contained a population of 7062 persons:
- "That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 792 persons, there is one chapel in the said parish, recently erected by your Majesty's said Commissioners, called St. Paul's Chapel, which affords accommodation to 1446 persons, including 746 free seats, appropriated to the use of the poor:
- "That the said chapel is consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:
- "Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the said chapel, called St. Paul's Chapel, under the provisions of the 16th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and that such district should be named St. Paul's District, with boundaries as follows:
- "The district is separated from the part of the parish of St. Wollos which still remains attached to the mother church, on the north by a straight line drawn from the river Usk, through the centre of Llanarth-street, crossing Commercial-street, and continued through Charles-street to a lane behind the stables of the Parrot Hotel, where a stone will be placed, shewing the boundary of the district in that direction; on the west by a straight line drawn from the said lane to King's-hill-gate, near Saint Paul's Church; on the north west by a fence, extending from King's-hill-gate to the footpath leading from the Cardiff-road to St. Wollos's Church, and thence by a straight line drawn from the end of the said fence to the back of the Old Toll-house, near Belle Vue, and thence by the Cardiff turnpike road to Ebbu-bridge; on the west it is separated from the parish of Basaleg by the river Ebbu; and on the south and east, from the parishes of Nash and Christ Church, by the river Usk, as the same is more particularly delineated in the plan hereunto annexed, and therein coloured yellow:

- "That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said chapel; and that the fees arising therefrom should, from and after the next avoidance of the parish church of St. Wollos, be received by, and belong to, the Minister of the said chapel:
- "That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Llandaff has been obtained thereto, as required by the abovementioned section of the said Act, passed in the 59th year of His Majesty King George the Third, in testimony of which the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:
- "Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore, beg leave to lay before your Majesty the beforementioned circumstances, and humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
