Adrianople, Odober 7. He Sieur de Guilleragues, Ambassador from France arrived here the 3. Inflant, having been received about two miles from this City by the Chaous Bachi and his Officers, and at fome diffance from thence by the Selictar Aga; or the Great Sword-Bearer, attended with a great number of Spahees; the Drogman Bachi having Complemented the Ambassador in the name of the Grand Vizier, his Excellency mounted on a Horse the Grand Signior uses to ride himself, with very rich Furniture, and there were 40 Horses more out of the Grand Signiors Stable (being a greater number than is ordinarily ient for an Ambassadors reception) for his Attendants; Having entred the Town, his Excellency was conducted through a lane of Janisaries, who were drawn out for that purpose to the House, which was prepared for him, where he was entertained with all forts of refreshments; his Excellency is offered Fooo Aspers for his daily Expence, and 6000 for his Drogermen. The Grand Vizer has sent Orders to twenty five of the chief Merchants ar Constantinople, to fit out each of them a Galley

Rosse. November 4. The Courier which was lately sent to Paris about the affairs of Geneva. returned hither the 28th of the last Month, with Letters for the Pope, and the French Ambassador at this Court, who had thereupon an Audience of his Holiness; and the next day a Courier was dispatched to Genous to give that Republick an account of the latisfaction the Most Christian King expects from them; One point whereof is, That they shall send their Doge and sour Senators to France to beg his Majesty's Pardon. We are told that the Pope is very much pressed by the Crowns to make a promotion of Cardinals at their Nomination, which his Holine's does not absolutely refule; but feems not to like the Persons recommended by them. His Holiness is much troubled at the ill account he has received of the Siege of Buda; The Cardinal Plo had the last week an Audience of him upon this Subject; and prayed his Holiness to send the Emperor a supply of Money to enable him to make the necessary preparations for the next Year. The Pope was on Sunday la very much indisposed, but is at present very well again.

Naples, Ollober 31. On Tuesday last four Gallies of the Great Duke of Tuscany, who are returning home, having been sent to the affifunce of the Venetians, arrived at the Isle of Nista, and are fince come into this Port; and most of the Officers and Soldiers are now ashore to refresh themselves. On Wednesstay last our Viceroy went to Nola to fee the Turkish Slaves that have been sent thither. to serve in the Gallies of this Kingdom. Several Banditi who obtained their Pardon upon their promise to serve against the Turks, endeavouring to escape out of the Arsenal where they were kept, have been condemned to the Gallies.

Genoua, November 5. The Senate have made choice of Signior Gio. Francisco Brignole to go The Senate have made in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick to the Pope, to defire his Holmess to em-

ploy effectually his Mediation for the compoling the affairs at prefent depending between the Most Chriitian King and this State. It is faid that his Mapublick shall pay 100 thousand Crowns to the Count de Flesque in part of satisfaction for his Pie-tentions till they be farther examined. The French Privateers have taken several Vessels be-

longing to the Subjects of this State.

Venice, November 11. We have not had any news from General Morofini fince the account we had of the taking of Prevefa, occasioned, it's believed, by the ill weather, which will doub less" oblige the Fleet to return home. The Senate begin already to direct the preparations for the next Summer, which we are affured will be much greater than those for the last; Several Foreigners are treating about raising Regiments in Germany and other Countries for the Service of the Republick; and a certain Person has presented to the Senate a New Invention for the making of Bombs, which he pretends will do greater execution than those at present used. This week Count Alber: Caprara, who was the Emperor's Minister at the Ottoman Port, arrived here from Rome, whither he had been fent by his Imperial Majesty upon some secret Negotiation; He will not stay many days here, having orders to, haften his return to Fiems. The Sieur d'Amelor, Ambaffador from his Most Christian Majesty, has received advice that he is to go and refide with the fame Character at the Court of Portugal. All our Advices from the Levant speak of the great preparations the Turks are making for the next Campagne.

Rasisbonne, November 19. Our last Letters from Vienna which are of the 16th Instant, suy only, That the Troops were going into their Winter-quarters; and that the Elector of Bavaria and the Duke of Lorrain were expected in few days at Vienna; but there are Letters from Hungary which speak of the Turks having fallen upon the Rear of the Christians in their march, and of their havi g cut off about 1000 of them, and taken some Wasons, but we do not give any great credit to it. The last advices from Poland tell us the ill weather had obliged the King to Separate his Troops, and to put them into their Winter Quarters; and that a Dyet was summoned to meet the beginning of funuary, The Count de Vallastain the Emperors Ambiffador at that Court has obtained leave to return home, but seeing there is a Dyet to be held,

it's believed he will stay till it be over.

Francfort, Nov. 20. The Emperor has writ to the States of the Circle of Suabia, to let them mow he has provided Winter Quarters for their Troops in Hungary; and to the States of Franco-nia to defire their a listance against the next Camp gie; when, if we may give credit to the advices that come from the Ottoman Territories, the Purks will have very great Armies in the Fleld, having spentall this year in p eparing for the next, The Count de Staremberg Governor of Vierna has been very ill, but our last Letters told us, they had great hopes of his recovery.

Hamburg. Nov. 21. Our last Letters from Smet-

bolme give an account that the Heer Van Hairen, Amballador from the States-General of the United

Provinces was upon his departure; but that he had had feveral Conferences with the principal Miniflers of that Court, about renewing the Defensive Alliance (which is going to expire) between that Crown and the States-General.

Hague, November 21. The differences arisen at Dors, about the Election of their Magistrates are not yet determined; The supreme Court of Justice in this Province pretended to take tognisance of them, and sent Commissioners thicker to examine things, but the Magistrates of that City not allowing the said Court to have any authority to judge of their proceedings of this kind, would not suffer any of the Inhabitants to appear before the said Commissioners, so that they returned hither without executing their Commission; And the matter is now brought before the States of Holland. The Baron Van Adelstein Envoy Extraordinary from the Landgrave of Hesse Casses has had his Audience of the States General. The Prince of Nassaw Stadtholder of Frizeland and Groningen is expected here in two or three days, part of his Baggage being already arrived.

Phymouth, Nov. 23. About Sixty Sail of Ships which came lately from the Downs, are by the bad weather and contrary winds put into this Port; The Kempthorne and some other great Ships which were of the same Fleet are it's supposed in Torbay. A Swedish or Danish Ship was cast away the last week not sar from this place, laden with Wines and Brandy. His Majesties Ship the Rose Prize wish sail with the first opportunity of Wind and weather to the Westward.
