NOTICE TO MARINERS. BEACON ON THE WOLF ROCK.

Trinity-House, London, July 21, 1840.

HE Corporation of Trinity-house have much satisfaction in stating, for the information of Masters of vessels and Mariners in general, that the difficult and hazardous works which have, during the last four summers, been in operation, under their direction, for constructing a beacon upon that dangerous rock called the Wolf, situate about $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. of the Land's End of Cornwall, have been completed, and that a conspicuous beacon has been erected thereon.

This beacon consists of an artificial cone, bearing a mast having a large ball upon its summit, at an elevation of 36 feet above the level of the sea at high water; and Mariners are to observe, that spring tides rise at this station 19 feet, and that at low water of those tides the rock is uncovered to the height of 15 feet.

The bearings and distances of the undermentioned objects from this beacon are as follows, viz.

Longships Light-house, N. E. Nly. distant 73 miles.

Scilly Light-house, W. by N. 1/2 N. distant 21 miles.

Rundlestone Rock, which covers at half flood, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. distant 7 miles.

Seven Stones, centre thereof, N. W. 1 N. distant 134 miles.

Lizard Light-houses, S. E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. distant 23 miles.

It being of great importance that this beacon should not sustain injury, Masters of vessels and others are hereby cautioned and enjoined not to approach it on any consideration, lest their own safety, as well as the security of the structure, should be thereby unnecessarily endangered.
