Westminster, August 4, 1840.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to provide for the administration of the Government, in case the Crown should descend to any issue of Her Majesty whilst such issue shall be under the age of eighteen years, and for the care and guardianship of such issue.

An Act to consolidate and amend the laws for collecting the duties of Excise on soap made in Great Britain.

An Act to continue compositions for Assessed Taxes until the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-two.

An Act to repeal so much of an Act, of the ninth year of the reign of Queen Anne, as prevents the re-election of Mayors of Parliamentary boroughs and other annual returning officers.

An Act to continue the Poor Law Commission until the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

An Act for making further provision for the confinement and maintenance of insane prisoners.

An Act to amend two Acts of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, for the relief of certain of Her Majesty's colonies and plantations in the West Indies.

An Act to consolidate and amend the laws for punishing mutiny and desertion of officers and soldiers in the service of the East India Company, and for providing for the observance of discipline in the Indian navy; and to amend the laws for regulating the payment of regimental debts and the distribution of the effects of officers and soldiers dying in service.

An Act for repairing Blenheim Palace.

An Act to authorise trustees or commissioners of turnpike roads to appoint meetings for executing their trusts in certain cases.

An Act to continue until the first day of June one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, or if Parliament shall then be sitting, until the end of the then session of Parliament, the local turnpike Acts for Great Britain, which expire with this or the ensuing session of Parliament.

An Act to authorise the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to grant a lease of the Caledonian Canal for a term of years, and to regulate the future management thereof.

An Act to provide for keeping the peace on canals and navigable rivers.

An Act to amend and explain the general turnpike Acts, so far as relates to the toll payable on carriages and horses laden with lime for the improvement of land.

An Act to enable the owners of settled estates to defray the expence of draining the same by way of mortgage.

An Act to enable proprietors of entailed estates in Scotland to feu or lease on long leases portions of the same, for the building of churches and schools, and for dwelling-houses and gardens for the ministers and masters thereof.

An Act to amend an Act of the seventh year of King George the Fourth, for consolidating and amending the laws relating to prisons in Ireland.

An Act to continue for one year from the passing of this Act, and thenceforth until the end of the then next session of Parliament, the several Acts for regulating the turnpike roads in Ireland.

An Act for vacating any presentment for rebuilding the gaol of Newgate in Dublin, and vacating any contract between the Commissioners for rebuilding the said gaol and the contractor.

An Act for further deepening and improving the river Clyde, and enlarging the harbour of Glasgow, and for constructing a wet dock in connection with the said river and harbour.

An Act for regulating, preserving, improving, and maintaining the river, port, and harbour of Dundalk, in the county of Louth, in Ireland.

An Act for regulating certain intended docks at Liverpool, to be called the Herculanæum Docks, and exempting vessels frequenting the same and their

cargoes from a portion of the tolls and duties payable to the Trustees of the Liverpool Docks.

An Act to enable the Harrington Dock Company to sue and be sued in the name of any member or officer of the said Company, and to exempt all vessels using the docks belonging to the said Company, and all goods shipped or discharged therein, or on the estate of the said Company, from the payment of certain rates, tolls, or duties to the Trustees of the Liverpool Docks.

An Act to alter, amend, and enlarge the powers and provisions of an Act for removing the markets held in the High and Fore-street, and other places, within the city of Exeter; and for providing other markets in lieu thereof.

An Act for establishing an improved ferry between the western part of the parish of Erskine, in the county of Renfrew, and Dumbarton, in the county of Dumbarton.

An Act to amend and render more effectual, so far as relates to the Lord Scudamore's charity moneys, the provisions of an Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, for improving the city of Hereford, and for other purposes connected with the said city.

An Act to authorise the trustees of the river Weaver, in the county of Chester, to apply part of the funds arising from the rates and duties payable in respect of the navigation of the said river, for the erecting and endowing one or more church or churches for the accommodation of the watermen, hawlers, and others employed upon the said river, and connected with the traffic thereof.

Whitehall, July 22, 1840.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Walter Powell, Esq. Lieutenant-Colonel in the Royal Marines, Her royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the cross, of the second class, of the National and Military Order of San Fernando, which the Queen Regent of Spain hath been pleased to confer upon him, in testimony of Her Catholic Majesty's approbation of his services in the different actions of war which have taken place from the first siege of Bilbao, in June 1835, to November 1837; and that he may enjoy all the rights and privileges thereunto annexed; provided, nevertheless, that Her Majesty's said licence and permission doth not authorize the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these realms:

And also to command, that Her Majesty's said concession and especial mark of Her royal favour be registered, together with the relative documents, in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Lieutenant Robert Hockings, of the Royal Marines, Her royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the cross, of the first class, of the National and Military Order of San Fernando, which the Queen Regent of Spain hath been pleased to confer upon him, in testimony of Her Catholic Majesty's approbation of his services in the different actions which took place from the 10th of May 1836 to November 1837; and that he may enjoy all the rights and privileges thereunto annexed; provided, nevertheless, that Her Majesty's said licence and permission doth not authorize the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these realms:

And also to command, that Her Majesty's said concession and especial mark of Her royal favour be registered, together with the relative documents, in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

The Queen has been pleased to present the Reverend Farquhar M'Ever to the church and parish of Glenshiel, in the presbytery of Lochcarron and county of Ross, vacant by the transportation of the Reverend John M'Rae to the parish of Glenelg.

THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of an ecclesiastical district to Trinity Chapel, Hermitage, in the parish of Hampstead Norris, in the county of Berks, under the 21st section of the 58th George 3, cap. 45:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 22d day of May 1840, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also of the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is, by the 21st section of the said Act, further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any populous parish or extra parochial place into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing

therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district; and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division;” and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled “An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;” and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled ‘An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;’” and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled “An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled ‘An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;’” further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council in the words following, viz.

“Your Majesty’s Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled “An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,” and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled “An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,” and further continued by an Act, passed in the first year of your Majesty’s reign, intituled “An Act to prolong for ten years Her Majesty’s Commission for building new churches,” beg leave to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the Hampstead Norris, in the county

of Berks and diocese of Oxford, contained a population of 1179 persons:

“That, besides the parish church, which affords accommodation to 380 persons, there is one chapel, recently erected in the said parish, called Trinity Chapel Hermitage, which affords accommodation to 250 persons, including 222 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

“That the said chapel has been consecrated, and divine service is regularly performed therein:

“Your Majesty’s said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient, that the said parish should be divided into ecclesiastical districts, under the 21st section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and that one of the said districts should be assigned to the said chapel, called Trinity Chapel Hermitage; for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving the said chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the district attached to the said chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be called the Hermitage District Parish, with boundaries as follows:—

“The district consists of the southern part of the parish of Hampstead Norris, and is bounded on or towards the east by the parishes of Bucklebury and Frilsham, on the south by the parish of Bucklebury, on the west by the parishes of Thatcham and Chieveley, and on the north east by the Four Elms-road, and on the north west by the road leading from Hermitage to Yattendon, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and therein coloured pink:

“That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Oxford has been obtained thereto, as required by the above-mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, and in testimony of such approbation the said Lord Bishop has signed and sealed this present instrument:—

“Your Majesty’s Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly to pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty’s royal wisdom shall seem meet.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
