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Naples, November 7.

This day was published here the Truce between the two Crowns. The Gallies of the Great Duke of *Tuscany* are kept in this Port by the ill weather; And the Officers are Treated by our Viceroy with great Civility; who hath offered to receive their sick Men into the Hospitals of this City, and to send them, when well, to *Legborne*. On Friday last arrived here by Sea 350 Spanish Soldiers to reinforce the Garisons in the Castles here.

Rome, November 18. We have advice that the Pope's Gallies and those of *Malta*, which have served in the Venetian Fleet this Summer, are arrived at *Messina*, having a great many sick Men on Board, Cardinal *Pio* had the last week another Audience of the Pope concerning the present state of Affairs in *Hungary*; We are told the Pope will assist the Emperor with fresh supplies of Money to forward the Preparations for the next Campaign.

Milan, November 22. The last week our Governour the Count de *Me'gar*, was present at a review of the Regiment of Swissers lately raised by Colonel *Beroldingen*, which at the same time received a months Pay. They write from *Turin* that the Marriage of the Prince of *Carignan*, Uncle to the Duke of *Savoy*, was carried so privately that it was not known at that Court till it was Consummated. There is, we are told, a Treaty on foot between the Crown of *France* and the Duke of *Mantua*.

Venice, November 25. On Monday arrived here a small Vessel with Letters from General *Morofini*, giving an account, that the ill weather had not suffered him to execute his designs upon the Fortresses of *Arta* and some other places in the Gulf of that name; That there were a great many sick Men in the Fleet; That Signior *Molico* was come to *Zant* with the Men of War under his command in pursuance of the Orders he had sent him; And that he intended to return home with the Fleet so soon as he had put *Prevesa* into a posture of defence. The last Letters from *Dalmatia* inform us, that the Preveditore-General *Falier* and the Prince of *Parma* were at *Liesna*, where is appointed the Rendezvous of the Troops; Not having as yet made any attempt upon *Castel-Novo*, for that the contrary Winds and ill weather have kept General *Morofini* from sending thither the Gallies and Galeasses that are to shut up the place on the side of the Sea. The Patriarck of *Venice* hath promised to give 3000 Ducats yearly towards the War against the Turks, and his Ex-

ample will be followed by the rest of the Clergy of this State. On Wednesday last the Senator *Zacharia Valareffo* took possession with the usually Solemnity of his new Dignity of Procurator of *St. Mark*.

Genova, November 25. This week arrived here the *William and David*, and the *Mary*, both laden with Corn from *Tabaredo*, The *Adventure*, the *Essex Merchant*, and the *Hannibal* are ready to sail. The last week parted from hence Signior *Gio. Francesco Briguole*, Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick to the Pope, to desire his Mediation on their behalf at the Court of *France*. The Gallies of this Republick were according to our last advices at *Barcelona*, but had received their Orders to return hither, and intended to sail with the first fair weather in company of the Gallies of *Naples*, *Sicily*, and *Sardinia*.

Cracow, November 16. The 9th Instant the King of *Poland* arrived at *Fawarow*, being met there by the Queen. The Troops are marched to their Winter-quarters, which are appointed as near the Frontiers as conveniently may be; and those Provinces that are freed from them, are to contribute in Money according to the Rult that was made the last Year at *Leopol*. The Towns of *Barr* and *Miedziboz* are assigned the Cossacks. The Palatin of *Russia*, Great General of the Crown, arrived the 7th of this month at *Leopol*, where the Deputies for the Distribution of the Winter Bread are at present Assembled. The place for the meeting of the Dyet is not yet fixed, for that they ought to meet this time in *Lithuania*, which will be very inconvenient in the present Conjuncture, and therefore the King hath written to the States of *Lithuania* to have their Consent that the Dyet may be held at *Leopol of Lublin*, which it's not doubted they will agree to. The Venetian Ambassador having received Orders to return home, is gone to *Fawarow* to take his leave of the King.

Ratisbonne, November 28. The 22. Instant the Imperial Commissioners represented, by a Memorial, to the States of the Empire Assembled here, That they had in *September* last demanded, in the name of his Imperial Majesty, their assistance against the Turks; And that they had now received Orders to make fresh Instances for that purpose, for that the danger with which not only the Emperor's Hereditary Countries but all *Germany* is threatened by the Common Enemy, increases daily; And that his Imperial Majesty will not be able alone to oppose the great Forces the Turks are preparing to bring into the Field the next Summer; but that if the Electors, Princes and States of the Empire do assist him according to the Example of their Predecessors, it will be easie, under the Divine Protection, to repulse this formidable Enemy.

Cologne,

Cologne, December 8. The Troops of the Elector of Brandenburg in Garrison here, being about 400 Men, having received orders to march to *Wesel*, the Officers were yesterday entertained by the Magistrates at the Town-house; and will begin their march on Monday or Tuesday next. They write from *Heydelberg* that the Elector Palatin had been very much indisposed, but that he was pretty well again. The 13 Swiss Cantons Assembled at *Baden* the 17th of the last month to deliberate among other things, upon the Proposals that have been made to them by the Emperor's Ambassador concerning their assisting his Imperial Majesty with a Body of Men in the War he is now engaged in against the Turks. The last Letters from *Vienna* are of the 29th past; They only tell us, that the Troops were everywhere going into their Winter-quarters; That great Preparations were making for the next Campaign; And that most of the Princes of the Empire would assist his Imperial Majesty. That the Elector of *Bavaria* was returned to *Munick*; the Marriage between him and the Arch-Duchess the Emperor's Daughter, being look'd upon to be as good as concluded; And that the Duke of *Lorraine* was in few days expected at *Vienna*.

Hamburg, Decemb. 7. The last Letters from *Warsaw* say the King of *Poland* had appointed the Senate to meet at *Cracow*, to consult with them about fixing the time and place for the meeting of the Dyets. And that the Polish Troops and those of *Lithuania* were marching to their Winter-quarters. We are told from *Berlin* that the Emperor hath written to the Elector of *Brandenburg* to desire his assistance against the Turks.

Hamburg, Decemb. 12. They write from *Dantzick*, that they had an account of the King of *Poland's* arrival at *Fawarow*; That the Army was separated, and the Troops marching to their Winter-quarters. That the Letters from *Moscow* said the Endeavors which have been used to induce the *Czars* to enter into the Alliance against the Turks, have not had any success, and that the Ministers that have been employed therein, are therefore leaving that Court. We are told from *Zell* that the *Sieur Chauvet* is to command the Troops with which the Princes of *Lunenburg* have promised to assist the Emperor.

Hague, Decemb. 15. The Court of *Holland* (which is the Supreme Court of Justice in this Province) have caused such of the Inhabitants of the Town of *Dort*, who did not yield Obedience to the Summons of the Commissioners they lately sent thither, to be cited to appear before them the 18th Instant here at the *Hague*. But the Magistrates of that City have forbid the said Inhabitants to take notice thereof, and have promised to protect them. In the mean time the Deputies of *Dort* in the Assembly of the States of *Holland* have complained of these Proceedings; Alleging that the said Court hath no manner of Jurisdiction in matters of this nature; upon which the said States have not as yet taken any final resolution. Prince *Casimir* of *Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friseland* and *Groningen*, parted from hence this week to return to *Leeuwarden*, the place of his usual resi-

dence; but it's said he will be here again very suddenly. The *Heer Van Citters*, Ambassador from this State in *England*, who came lately over to look after his private Affairs, will embark in two or three days in order to his return thither. The 13th Instant the Deputies of the States General had another Conference with the *Ba. on Foel* Ambassador from the King of *Denmark*; concerning the Treaty of Commerce lately concluded between his Majesty and this State.

Paris, Decemb. 16. The Court continues still at *Versailles*; but will it's said remove from thence to *St. Germain* before the end of this month. The King has given to the Eldest Son of the Count *d'Esfree*, Vice-Admiral of *France*, the Reversion of that Office. The Count *de Solfons* is returned hither from *Turin*. The *Chevalier de Chaumont*, whom the King has appointed his Ambassador to the King of *Siam*, has leave to choose 12 Gentlemen out of the Guards Marine to accompany him in his Embassy.
