THE following is a copy of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, for the assignment of a consolidated chapelry district to Christ Church, Gentleshawe, taken from the respective parishes of Longdon and Cannock, in the county of Stafford, under the provisions of the 6th section of the 59th Geo. 3, cap. 134:

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 22d day of May 1840, present, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," it is, amongst other things, en-acted, " that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto, under his hand and seal; and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue, and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of tees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in-Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and it is by the 21st section of the said Act further enacted, "that in any case in which the said Commissioners shall be of opinion that it is not expedient to divide any pópulous parish, or extra parochial place, into such complete, separate, and distinct parishes as aforesaid, but that it is expedient to divide the same into such ecclesiastical districts as they, with the consent of the Bishop, signified under his hand and seal, may deem necessary, for the purpose of affording accommodation for the attending divine service, according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, to persons residing therein, in the churches and parochial chapels already built, or in additional

churches or chapels to be built therein, and as may appear to such Commissioners to be convenient for the enabling the spiritual person or persons who may serve such churches or chapels, to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the districts attached to such respective churches and chapels, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the religious and moral habits of the persons residing therein, the said Commissioners shall represent such opinion to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which such districts are proposed to be described; and if, thereupon, His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled . An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes; after reciting that a considerable population is frequently collected together at the extremities of, and locally situate in, parishes or extra-parochial places contiguous to each other, at a distance from the respective churches or chapels of such respective parishes or extra-parochial places, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with such consent as is required by the said recited Act, in the case of district parishes, to unite and consolidate any such contiguous parts of such parishes, and extra-parochial places, into a separate and distinct district for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to cause such district to be named, ascertained, and marked out by described bounds; and such name, and the description of such bounds, when approved by His Majesty in Council, to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese to which such district shall belong under the provisions of this Act, and to make grants or loans for or towards the building of, or to build any chapel or chapels with or without cemeteries in, and for the use of the inhabitants of any such district, in such manner, and under such regulations, as may in the judgment of the Commissioners appear, from the circumstances, to be most expedient; and to constitute any such district a consolidated chapelry; and every such chapelry shall be under the superintendence of such spiritual person as shall be appointed under the provisions of this Act, to serve any such chapel; and such spiritual person shall have cure of souls in such district, and the right of presentation and appointment of such spiritual person shall thenceforth belong to such person or persons, and be exercised in such manner as may be agreed by the several patrons of the churches or chapels of such parishes and extra-parochial places respectively, with the approbation of the Commissioners; and banns of marriage may be published, and marriages, christenings, churchings, and burials may be solemnized and performed in any such chapel immediately, and at all times after the consecra-

clerk assigned therefrom, in such manner as is directed in the said recited Act, or in this Act, concerning pew rents and salaries in separate or district parishes, and all fees and offerings which may arise and accrue within such chapelry, according to such table of fees as the said Commissioners shall make, with the approbation of the Bishop, may be demanded, received, sued for, prosecuted, and recovered by the spiritual person having cure of souls therein, and by the clerk and sexton of such chapelries in like manner as if every such chapelry was a distinct parish; and it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, and they are hereby required in every such case, to ascertain and make compensation in manner directed in like cases under the said recited Act, for any loss which may be sustained by the incumbent of any contiguous parish or extraparochial place, which shall form part of any such district, by reason of any fees, oblations, and offerings being transferred to the spiritual person serving any such chapel, and all such chapelries shall be deemed to be benefices, and be subject to the jurisdiction of the Bishop and Archdeacon within whose diocese and archdeacopry the altar of such chapel shall be locally situate, and to all the laws in force concerning presentation and appointment to benefices and churches, and lapse, and all other laws relating to the holding of benefices and churches; and it is, by the 16th section of the said Act, further enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, in the same manner and with the like consents as are required in case of division into ecclesiastical districts under the said hereinbefore recited Act, or the said Act now in recital, to assign a particular district to any chapel of ease or parochial chapel already existing, or to any chapel built, or which might thereafter be built, or acquired under the powers of the said former Act, or the said Act now in recital; and such district shall be under the immediate care of the Curate appointed to serve such chapel, but subject, nevertheless, to the superintendence and controul of the incumbent of the parish church; and all such Curates shall be nominated by the incumbent of the parish to the Bishop for his licence, except where the right of nomination shall already be legally vested in any other person or persons, and in every such case by the person or persons possessing such right of nomination, subject to all the laws in force relating to Stipendiary Curates, except as to the assigning of salaries to such Curates; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese, to determine whether any and what part or proportion of the fees or dues for marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be assigned to any such Curate; and whether banns of marriage shall be published, and marriages or baptisms, churchings or burials, shall be solemnized or performed in any such chapel or not; and in any case in which marriages shall be allowed in any such chapel, the Commissioners shall cause the boundaries of the district assigned to such chapel to be enrolled in the High Court of Chancery, and in the office of the Registry of the diocese, any thing in the said recited Act to the tion thereof; and the pew rents in such chapel contrary notwithstanding; and no such chapelry shall be fixed, and salaries to the minister and shall become a benefice by reason of any augmentation of the maintenance of the Curate, by any grant or bounty under the provisions of any Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws for augmenting small livings, any thing in such Act or Acts of Parliament, or law or laws, to the contrary notwith-standing; and whereas by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and by another Act, made and passed in the 1st and 2d years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty, initialed 'An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and also by another Act, made and passed in the 2d and 3d year of His said late Majesty, intituled " An Act to render more effectual an Act, passed in the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to Her Majesty in Council, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, appointed by virtue of an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled " An Act for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes;" and continued by an Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes; and further continued by an Act, passed in the 1st year of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prolong, for ten years, Her Ma-jesty's commission for building new Churches;" beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, when the last census was taken, the parish of Longdon, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, contained a population of 1147 persons; and the adjoining parish of Cannock, in the same county and diocese, contained a population of 3116 persons:

"That the parish church of Longdon affords accommodation for 400 persons, and that of Cannock

for 600 persons:

"That a new chapel, called Christ Church, has recently been erected at Gentleshawe, in the said parish of Longdon, near the extremity of the said parish, where it adjoins to the said parish of Cannock, and which affords accommodation to 240 persons, including 214 free seats appropriated to the use of the poor:

"That the said chapel is distant upwards of two miles from the parish churches of Longdon

said chapel appropriated to the celebration of divine service according to the rites of the Church of England:

"That the extremities of the said parishes of Longdon and Cannock which lie contiguous to each other, and are delineated in the accompanying plan, contain a population of 530 persons:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances above mentioned, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate the said contiguous parts of the said parishes of Longdon and Cannock into a separate and distinct district, to be assigned to the said chapel, called Christ Church, at Gentleshawe, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to constitute such district a consolidated chapelry, under the 6th section of an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," for the purpose of affording accommodation for attending divine service to the persons residing in the said district, and for enabling the spiritual person serving such chapel to perform all ecclesiastical duties within the said district attached to such chapel, and for the due ecclesiastical superintendence of such district, and the preservation and improvement of the moral habits of the persons residing therein; and that such district should be named "The Gentleshawe District," and that the boundaries thereof should be as follows:

" Commencing on the south west side of the parish of Longdon on Cannock Chase, at the point marked A on the plan, where two brooks unite, the boundary is defined by the stream called Bye-brook, which also separates Cannock from Burntwood, so far as to Noddy-field-valley; and from thence, dividing the said parish of Cannock by a small stream of water, along the same valley to, or near to, the source of the stream at the point B; from thence, by a straight line, to the top of the inclosures at C; and from thence, by the public carriage road, along the open Chase leading to the east side of Hazle-shade, by the point D to the point E, where the parish of Cannock is separated from the parish of Rugeley by a small brook; from thence, down the course of the said brook, which is also the boundary between the said parishes of Rugeley and Cannock, through Bean-desert park, to the poin: F, where the brook enters into the parish of Longdon; from thence, by the same brook, dividing the parish of Longdon, through the Marquess of Anglesey's kitchen garden, to the point G, at the north east corner of a piece of land, called Spring Piece, in the possession of the said Marquess of Anglesey; from thence, by the east side of the same piece of land, along the fence by which it is separated from the adjoining plantation to the point H; from thence, along the fence on the south side of the same plantation, and the east and south sides of the Walnuttree-field, occupied by Edward Sharratt, to Horseylane, at the point I; from thence, along Horseyand Cannock, which are the places nearest to the lane to Cross Ash, at the point J; from thence,

turning towards the south west, along the public received from his Grace the Duke of Norfolk, highway to the point K, near to Longdon Hall Farm, belonging to the said Marquess of Anglesey, and in the occupation of Richard Arblaster; from thence, by a bridleway and footway, through the same farm, and through another farm, in the occupation of James Pegg, to the point L, near the Grosvenor-green; from thence, by a line of fences, on the north side of Joseph Dodd's Grosvenor Green Piece, and on the north east side of William Adey's Moat Piece, and Little Well Field; and continuing in the same direction to the brook in the said William Adey's Upper Meadow, at the point M, adjoining to the parish of Farewell; from thence, southward, by the boundary which separates the parish of Longdon from the parish of Farewell; and which said parish boundary passes through George Mann's Farm and buildings, and down the course of a brook through Joseph Holme's Farm, as marked N, O, P, Q, to the side of a public highway leading to Burntwood, at the point R; from thence, by the boundary which separates the parish of Longdon from the township of Burntwood, and which runs on the north west side of a public carriage road, over the Budd's common, and on the south east of John Lane's encroachment, to a certain brook at the point S, below the site of Cony Mill; and from thence, up the ancient brook course, by the site of the said mill, as marked T, U, V, upon the said plan, to the aforesaid point A, where the description first com-menced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the plan hereunto annexed, and is surrounded by shades of blue and red:

"That the consent of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield has been obtained thereto, as required by the said Act of the 59th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; and in testimony of such approbation the said Lord Bishop has signed

and scaled this present instrument:

" Your Majesty's Commissioners beg leave, therefore, to lay before your Majesty the above-stated circumstances, and humbly to pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty's royal wisdom shall seem meet.'

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed union and consolidation and assignment be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
