Pendennis, Oct. 7.

N Saturday in the evening arrived here a Swede from Hamborough, and a Dutch Merchant from Amfterdam, both of them bound for Bourdeaux. The laft week two Durch Veffels comming too near the Lizard, ran upon the Rocks, and were in fight of land caft away. A Genouefe fhip that has been two dayesriding at Ancho-, was at the laft caft upon the Rocks and broken to pleces, but the men all faved, her lading faid to

be confiderable, and bound for London.

Swanfey, Off. 7. This last weck a veffel belonging to the Forrest of Dean, homewards bound from Wexford, having firk frent all her Sails, was by the violence of the winds thrown on thore within ten miles of this place, but the men with mon other Veffels bound from Ireland with Cattle, were alfo cat away not far from this place, the men of both of them faved, and the Cattle of one of them, which were feiled according to the Act of Parliament. Several other Veffels which came at the same time from Toughall and Wexford, are thought to be

Falmouth,Oft. 7. Yefterday put in here the Dove of Horne, bound for Rochell, by whom we are informed, that the came Istely out from the Texel in company of 100 Merchantmen and two States Men of War their Convoy, be und fome for the Streights, and others for feveral parts of France, th ut 60 of shem new fhips, but were seperated by Storm, whereof two more are also put in here, the reft of them are ftill beating it

Here is also come in a Plymouth thip, which has been ten dayes at Sen, intended for Barbadoes, but by il weather forced in bither.

Several thips have been lately caft away at Ses, particularly, two Genouese thips comming from Amfterdam, homewards b und, were lately loft about the Lizard, one of them called the Crucifix, of 80 guns and 200 men, which were most of them drowned; the other a Vell I of 30 guns, which periffied with all her men, and with them a Dutch Pink which ran

Newcaffle, Off. 8. On Saturday laft our laden Fleet b.gan to get out to Sen, and on Monday were all under fail for the

Southwards, mon of them great fhips.

Tarmouth, Off. 9. Yefterdey came in the Milford Fregst Into this Road from the Northward, where the is come to an Anchor : the laft night a V:ffel of this place was caft away upon the Sands of Winterton about leven miles frem this plece, the Mafter and one boy drowred, all the reft of the men laving themselves by swimming to the shore. Il re are now between 50 and 60 fall at Archor in this Road, fome of them laden, Southwards bounc, the other light fhips, bound for Newcaftle and other places.

Vienna, Od. 1. On Sunday laft the Emprels after eight hours Labour, was, to the great joy of the Emperour and this whole Court, fafely delivered of a young Prince, for which Te Deum was fung in all the Churches, the Guns round the City fired, and Expresses Ordered to be speedily dispatched to Spain, and the Courts of other Princes with the

Yekerday in the afternoon, the young Prince was Biptized by the Bifhop of this City, and named Ferdinandus Wencessaus Michael Fosephus Elgearius. The Emperor supplying the place of the King of spain his Godfather, and the Empres Dowager affisting as Godmother; the Geremony ending, Te Deum was sealn lung by the Quire, after which were discharged several Volleyes of thot by the Guards, and the guns thrice fired round the Town, twelve Trumpeters continually founding three bours together, with all other figure and demonfrations of joy that u'e to be expressed on fuch occafions. The Spanish Ambestador also throwing money to the people, and entertaining them with a Fountain of Wine.

Hamburgh, Oct. 11. His Msjefty of Denmark with his Court, continues ftill at Gluckfladt, where are alfo arrived the Dukes of Brunfwick and Lucenburg, and the Bishop of Ofnabrug. There are also expected the Marquels of Bran-denburg and the Duke of Holfiein, and 'tis believed forme great Alisace and Marriage will be suddenly concluded

Hague, Oct. 13. The Squadr m under the Command of ieutenant Admiral Van Nefs is in few daies to be diftributed into feveral Ports , and to be laid up for this Winter ; as is likewife that other under the Command of Admiral De Ruyter, who has for fome time been riding neer the Coafts but we fear may have received fome damage by the late great Rorms which have forced him from his Ration.

The Heer Van Beuninghen is now returned hither from the Court of France, and given an account to the States of all

his Negotiation, to their great fathstaction.

From Munfler we are told, that the Levies made by the Bishop of that place serve only for the compleating of his old Regiments, he being refolved to keep up for fome time fuch a standing force as shall be a sufficient Guard to him again . all accidents. 'Tis faid he has lately fur pended feveral of the Chapter, whom he fulpected to have been the chief it perfons that endeavoured to oppose him on several occasions, who were thereupon retired to Cologne, where they are confuling of the fi teft mans to re-enablish thems lives.

Tis faid that his Highmels the Blector of Cologne has fent to Rome to complain there against the Bishop of Muniter, as having upon his own Authority conferred the Cra just-ship of Munfter upon the Bishop of Paterborne, contra y to the Nomination of the Chapter, and the usual forms of pro-ceeding in such Elections; and 'is feared this may engage not only those Countries, but the whole Empire in many troubles, should the Elictor of Cologne proceed (as 'tis much doubted he will) to justifie the Nomination made to his advantage by the Sword , and call in fome neighbouring forces to his affi trance. In the mean time the Bifhops of Munfler and Paterborne are foliciting the States of the Empire for prot ction, in which they make use of the Mediation of the Cardinal de Saltzbourg, with whom they have contracted a clofe Correspondency.

The bulinels in difpute betwixt the States and the Crown of Portugal, is again fallen under confideration, and fom: conference has already paffed betwixt fome of their Deputies and the Portugais Ambaffedor upon that Subj &; and 'tis believed that affair will in little time be brought to fome if-

The F'uyt that attended the Heer Meer aan out Ambaffador for England , was by ill weather for ed back to Helvoet-Slujs, but the Min of War in which tras the Ambaffador himfelf, kept out at S:a, th' ugh with fon a damage , and we hope may be fafely arrived where he inter ded.

The States have not yet nomina ed the persons defigned to Command the Army which they int nd to mainteln and keep in readin is to tike the Field upon any occasion that

may offer le felf.

The diff rences between the Datche's of Eaft-Vriefland and the States there, are not yet reconciled. The Heer De

Groot , who is Refident from the Dutche's , ftill contlaues here, folkicing on the behalf of his Miftrels, and has fo far revailed, that fome Deputies are fent into Eaft-Priefland to take cogniz nee of the whole bufinels, and if poffible, to end

It by an amicable condificention on both parts.

Amfterdam, Off. 16. The fafe return of our Eat India Fleet has much rejoyced the spirits of our Merchants, the whole Fl et being very richly laden, confiding of 12 ships, whereof aine from Batavia, the other three from the Ille of Ceylon, of which number, five of them were bound for this City, fou for Rotterdam, and three for Zealand; only three of them are as yet come into our Ports, but the reft fuddenly expected, baving been forced to ride le out at Sea during the

late ill w ather.

The Directo's of the Baft India Company are gone to the Texel or Mly to receive them. One of this Fleet called the Walcheren, unhappily foundred about Fere, but her goods and men preferred 3 another of them called The Arms of Amflerdam, was near the fame place f perated from the rek of the Company, and not yet returned as was reported. Those from Batavia came thence the 25th of Fannary under the Command and Conduct of the Heer Van Dam, and in their way rook into their company the three others from Ceylon. The Tyger and Conftancy, two other of our Ban India thips, are yet behind at Batavia, but will not be exp. &:d before Febru-

We hear of feveral Weecks upon our Coafts and have great apprehenfi ma left the Fleet of Merchants, forme few dayes fine: put to Ses fr m the Texel, may dave run much hazard

Tins Week sirly. da Courier fent from the Emperour to the Sieur de Wicke his Refident here, who immediately upon the receipt of his Letters, went hence for St. Germains for bis Audience, but not finding the ufual Mafter of the Certmonies, he applied himfelf to Mounfieur de Lyonne, who in-troduced him to his MajeRy, where by the Emperous Commind, he acquainted the King with the news of the happy Delivery of the Emprels of a Son on the 28 h paft, which was Refident, by his M.jefty with all testimonies of joy, and the Queen, who received from him the News with much fatif-

The Prince of Conde has at the laft the liberty given him to entertain under his Command the four Regiments of Font which formerly ferved him, viz. the Regiments of Gonde, D' Enguien, Burgundy and De Perfan, as a lo his own Regiment of Horfe, with his Light Horfemen and Men at Arms.

His M. jesty has also given to the Marquels de Bellefonds the Command of 3000 Horle, with which he is to make Incursions upon the Enemy between the Sambre and the
