*Cracow, November 25.*

**T**He 10th Instant the King of Poland arrived at *Famarow*, and having rested the two or three days he parted from thence with the Queen for *Zolkiew*, whither his Majesty has desired all the Senators to repair, that he may consult with them upon several important matters. The States of *Lithuania* intend to have the Dyet meet at *Grodno*, which will be very inconvenient in the present juncture of Affairs. They write from *Leopol* that an Envoy was arrived there from the King of *Tartary*; and that it was reported he came to make Proposals of Peace. Count *Wallaftain* the Emperor's Ambassador, is gone to *Zolkiew* to take his leave of the King, having orders to return home.

*Vienna, December 3.* We do not hear that any new Regiments will be raised against the next Campaign; but on the contrary that several which are very much weakened, will be reformed, and the Men put into those that are kept on foot, into which will be likewise incorporated the Troops raised by the Emperor's Hereditary Countries, amounting to about 12000 Men. His Imperial Majesty has written a Circular Letter to all the Electors, Princes, and Towns of the Empire, to let them know the great danger that threatens *Germany*, and to desire them to give him such assistances as may enable him to oppose the great Forces of the Enemy. They write from *Upper Hungary* that General *Schultz*, being reinforced with some fresh Troops, was set down before *Esperies*, and had begun to batter the place with 16 Pieces of Cannon. The 29th past parted from hence the Elector of *Bavaria* for *Munick*, intending to return hither against the *Carnival*, or at farthest before *Easter*: And the next day arrived here the Duke of *Lorraine*, who has since assisted at several Councils of War. Count *Ernest Caprara* has orders to repair to *Presbourg* where the Principal Nobility of *Hungary* are appointed to meet to consider how they may best assist his Imperial Majesty the next Campaign. Count *Albert Caprara*, the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary to the Pope and other Princes of *Italy*, returned hither on Friday last. The Emperor is sending the Count *de Claris* to the Elector of *Saxony*; And the Baron *de Freytag* to the Elector of *Brandenburg*. There are Letters from *Newfol* which tell us, that the Rebels having drawn together to the number of 2000, they marched towards *Newfol* with a design to surprize it, but that the Governor having notice thereof, marched out with 5 or 600 Men, and defeated them, many of the Rebels being killed upon the place, and the rest retiring in great confusion. Count *Trekeley* was, according to our last advices at *Caschau*. The Serasquier Bassa is gone to *Adrianople* to give the Grand Signior an account of the last Campaign.

*Vienna, December 7.* The Emperor has named the Count *de Martiniz* to go in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Princes of *Italy* to sollicite their assistance against the Turks: And the Count *de Nostitz* will be sent with the same Character to the King of *Denmark*. The Duke of *Lorraine* is not yet perfectly recovered of the Ague

which he got before *Buda*, but intends to go from hence in few days for *Inspruck* to pass the Winter there. *Newheusel* will be very closely blocked up this Winter; And the Hussars have taken out of the neighboring Villages all the Cattle and Corn, and have burnt or carried away all the Wood, of which the Enemy have great want. There is a report that the Turks have surprized *Vaccia* between *Graz* and *Pest*, and put the Garrison, consisting in about 500 Men, to the Sword. The last Letters from General *Schultz* are of the 13th of the last month; He was then before *Esperies*, and had raised three Batteries against the Place, which next to *Caschau* is the most considerable in *Upper Hungary*. General *Leslie* hath put his Troops into their Winter-quarters, and hath taken particular care to leave a good Garrison in *Virovitz*. They write from *Poland* that the Moscovites have attacked some places belonging to that Crown, which though they are of no great consideration, yet may occasion a rupture between those two Nations.

*Katisbonne, December 14.* The Troops that were before *Buda* are not yet in their Winter-quarters, the ill weather and broken Ways having very much hindered them in their march. General *Schultz* has, notwithstanding the Season is so far advanced, Besieged *Esperies*, and there are Letters from *Hungary* which say he has taken it, but it needs a confirmation. The Emperor hath written to the Imperial Towns of *Ausbourg*, *Ulm*, *Nuremberg*, and this City, requiring them to assist him with some Cannon for the Service of the next Campaign. The Elector of *Bavaria* is returned to *Munick*; and has given out orders for the recruiting his Troops; It's said he will have the next Summer 18000 Men in *Hungary* at his own Charge.

*Cologne, December 15.* The Count *de Daun* the Imperial Envoy, having finished his Negotiation with the Elector of *Cologne* at *Liege*, is returned hither; And has delivered a Letter to the Magistrates of this City, wherein his Imperial Majesty requires their assistance. The *Brandenburg* Troops that were in Garrison here marched the 11th Instant, and those of *Newburg* will follow in two or three days; Though these Magistrates would have been glad to have had them remain here some time longer. The Elector of *Cologne* who parted from *Liege* the 12th Instant, was expected last night at *Breuil*, and will be this day at *Bonne*. They write from *Munick* that the Elector of *Bavaria* arrived there the 4th Instant, and that the next day, after having assisted at the *Te Deum* which was sung for his safe return, he had held a great Council, to whom he had communicated his resolution of assisting the Emperor in the Spring with an Army of 18 or 20000 Men.

*Hamburg, December 15.* The Duke of *Hanover* is gone to make the Elector of *Brandenburg* a Visit at *Potsdam*, where his Electoral Highness at present is, very much indisposed with the Gout. The Letters from *Poland* say that the King had staid only some few days at *Famarow*, removing from thence to *Zolkiew*, where he arrived the 17th of the last month. That the Nobility of *Lithuania* would by no means consent that the Dyet should be held at *Leopol* or *Lublin*, claiming their right of having

It meet this time at *Grodno*, which is the Capital City of *Lithuania*; but that the King had again written to them to shew them how necessary it is that he should remain near the Frontiers, with his Presence to quicken the Preparations for the next Campaign, and consequently how prejudicial it may be to the Publick for the Dyet to meet in this busy Conjunction at *Grodno*. The Letters from *Moscow* of the 21. of *October* tell us, that the two Czars, who had been several months in the Country, were returned thither; And that there seemed to be no manner of disposition at that Court to engage in the War against the Turks.

*Brussels, Decemb. 15.* The States of *Brabant* and of the other Spanish Provinces are at present wholly taken up with raising of Money to pay their Contributions, and have been forced to put several places under Military execution to oblige them to send in their Quotas. The Letters from *Liege* of the 13th Instant tell us, that the Elector of *Cologne* their Prince parted from hence the day before by Water to *Eysden*, from whence he would continue his journey by Land; The Bishop of *Strasbourg* remains at *Liege* to assist the Council appointed by his Electoral Highness for the ordering the Publick Affairs, whose directions the Burghermasters and Council of the City are in all things to follow. They write from *Vienna* that the Marriage between the Elector of *Bavaria* and the Arch-Dutchess the Emperor's Daughter, was concluded. And that his Electoral Highness will have the next Summer a brave Army of his own in the Field, which he will again command in Person.

*Brussels, Decemb. 19.* From *Saturday* morning till last night we were here in much disorder. On *Friday* the Nations assembled to renew the Imposts upon Beer, &c. But they desired that first the extraordinary Duties upon the Consumption of all Provisions should be taken off, and the Impositions reduced to the foot of 1681; and till this was granted, they would not leave the Town-House, where they continued *Saturday* and *Sunday*, day and night; whereupon the Rabble got together, and made a great Tumult; and the Marquis de *Groux* sending his Guards to disperse them, several were killed and wounded on both sides, which put the whole Town into an Alarm; the Houses and Shops as well as the Gates of the City were kept shut, and the Burghers put them selves in Arms, but yesterday in the evening all was quieted; the Burghermasters by his Excellencies Order declaring that the said extraordinary Duties should not be paid for the future: And this morning the Nations consented to the said Imposts.

*Hague, December 19.* The States of *Holland* and *West Friesland* re-assembled this day; And it's believ'd they will at this meeting come to some determination in the Affair of the Town of *Dort*. The Commissioners that are to go for *England* about the Business of *Rantam*, are preparing for their departure. They are making at *Amsterdam* several new Fortifications for the greater security of that City.

*Whitchal, Decemb. 12.* The Right Honourable the Earl of *Bath* being lately at his Government of *Northampton*, to settle by His Majesty's Command the Affairs of that Garrison, and the Militia of *Coramul* under his Lieutenantcy, The several Towns and Burroughs within the Dutchy of *Coramul*, who had unanimously and with great cheerfulness resolved to surrender their Charters and Franchises to His Majesty, made their Applications to his Lordship as their Lord Lieutenant, to intercede with His Majesty, that they might, by reason of the great distance, be excused from their personal attendance with their Surrenders and Charters: To which His Majesty being pleased to condescend, the said Corporations delivered their Surrenders to his Lordship for His Majesty's use, humbly praying him to lay them at

His Majesty's Feet, which his Lordship at his return hither having done accordingly with a Petition on their behalf, His Majesty was pleas'd Graciously to accept of them, and to command his Lordship to assure the said Corporations, that He very well remembered the Duty and Loyalty of that County in the worst times of Rebellion, and was well pleas'd with this fresh Demonstration of it by them.
