

He will part from hence the next week for *Germany* to raise Men.

Vienna, December 10. The account we had of the taking of *Vaccia* by the Turks, is confirmed; The Garrison consisted of about 500 Men, but of these two thirds were Hungarians, who obliged the rest to Surrender upon Articles, which were not kept by the Turks, for they afterwards fell upon the Germans; plundered them and cut many of them in pieces. The Imperialists have quite destroyed the Country two or three miles round *Newbusei* to straighten the Garrison of that place. The Duke of *Lorraine* will part from hence the next week for *Insprucke*. The Imperialists it's said have quitted *Barkum*.

Kranfurt, December 12. The Letters from *Vienna* assure us, The Emperor will have a very great Army the next Summer; his Ministers having agreed with most of the Princes of the Empire for the Troops which they are to send to his Imperial Majesty's assistance. The Duke of *Lorraine*, and the Prince of *Baden* President of the Council of War, were come to *Vienna*, but the first would make no long stay there, intending to pass the Winter at *Insprucke*. The Count *Petrozzi* who had got together a body of 1500 Hungarians hath been lately defeated by 500 Horse of the Regiment of *Rabata*, who were marching to *Newsol* to Winter there. They write from *Heydelberg* that the Elector Palatin is going to raise two Regiments for the Service of the Emperor.

Brussels, December 22. The Nations here have consented to the Imposit upon Beer, &c. for six months; and have likewise renewed the ordinary Duties upon the Consumption of Provisions; And the Marquis de *Grana* hath sent Orders to *Newport* and *Ostend* for the regulating the Customs upon Goods Imported and Exported, according to the Rates set in the time of the Prince of *Parma*, late Governour of these Provinces, which are judged to be very moderate: they write from *Liege* of the 13 Instant that the 16 Chambers, established by the new regulation in the place of the 32 Trades or Companies, being Assembled, a supply of 800 thousand Crowns, had been demanded of them to reimburse his Electoral Highness the Charges he hath been at in reducing that City to it's Duty; and that it was told them several Merchants in *Holland* would advance that sum in case they would on the behalf of the Town give Security to pay the same in four years; but that the said Chambers had answered that the City was not in a condition to raise so great a sum; The Letters add, that several of his Electoral Highness's Troops which were marching to their Winter-quarters, were ordered to return to *Liege*. The last Letters from *Vienna* are of the 10 Instant; They tell us that the Turks had made themselves Masters of *Vaccia*. And that General *Schmitz* had been obliged by the ill weather and the strength of the Garrison, to quit the Siege of *Espertes*.

Hague, December 22. The States of *Holland* re-Assembling the 19th Instant, the Deputies of *Dort* presented to the Assembly a particular account in Writing of the late Election of their Magistrates, and what hath since passed thereupon between the *Boss Van Holland* (the Supreme Court of Justice of this Province) and the said Town; Wherein they endeavor to justify the Proceedings on their side; And to refute the Arguments that are made use of to support the Jurisdiction of the said Court in matters of this nature: But we do not hear that the States have taken any resolution in this Affair; And it's said they will separate to day or to morrow till the second of the next month.

Paris, December 23. The Popes Nuncio continues to labour very earnestly to accommodate the Affairs of *Genoua*; He had another Audience of the King on this Subject the 21. Instant; but it's said his Majesty insists upon the Satisfaction he has demanded of the Republick. The King of *Poland* we are told, is sending hither a very Solemn Embassie to demand *Madamoiselle de Bourbon* in Marriage for the Prince his Eldest Son. The Venetians have lost two Men of War of above 60 Guns apiece, which were cast away in a great storm.
