The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

I T is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the twelfth day of November instant, be further prorogued to Thursday the tenth day of December next.

Great Level of the Wash.
