Lisbonne, November 20.

St. Romain, Ambassador Extraordinary s. om France, had the last week a private Audience of the King; He then acquainted his Majesty with the Choice the King his Maller hath made of the Sieur d'. meior to succeed him as his Amballador at this Court; The Marquis de Torey Envoy Extraordinary from his Most Christian Majesty, will part from hence the next week on his return to France. The Fleet from the Bay of All-Saints confilt ng in 18 Merchant Ships richly laden, arrived here the latter end of the last month. And this week came into this Port 20 Merchant Ships laden with Sugar and Tobacco from Fernambique; But as yet we have no news of the Flet f om the Rio. Faneyro. which lately arrived here from Gba, brought Letters from Don Francisco de Tauora Vice Roy of the Indies, written at Goa the 22. of Fanuary last; They give an account, That the War continuing between Sultan Mureng Zeb Emperor of the Mugols and the Prince his Aldest Son, the Raja Sevagi, a neighboring Prince who takes the part of the Burg Prince, after committing divers Hostilities upon the Portuguese, for that they had given pallage through their Territories to the Forces of Aureng Zeb advanced with a great Army and be leged Goa, which put the Inhabitants of that City into great disorder, the Viceroy (who was gone with several Vessels to succor Cochim which was threatned with a Siege) being not only absent but greatest part of the Garison being drawn out to secure those places that lay most exposed to the Enemy; So that all the Inhabitants of Goa, that were capable of it, and even the Clergy were obliged to bear Arms; The Portuguese gave notice to Aureng Zeb of the danger they were in, and prayed him that he would assist them according to the Treaties of Alliance they had with him; The Sultan thereupon sent immediately orders to his second Son to oppose the Enterprises of the Raja; And accordingly this young Prince advanced with an Army of an Hundred thousand Foot, Fourscore thousand Horse, 500 Elephants, and 18000 Camels, besides a vast number of Horses and Oxen for Carriage, and a very good Train of Artillery under the command of an Englishman; This great Army marched along the Sea Coast, being followed with a great number of Vessels to supply them with Provisions and Ammunition; But the Raja Sevagi being informed of the march of the Mogols; and the Besseged on the other side making a very brave resistance, presently raised the Siege, and in his retreat, which was with much disorder, destroyed all the Country about Goa, which had caused there a great scarcity of all forts of Provisions. The day before these Letters were written, an Ambassador arrived at Goa from the Prince who commanded the Army of the Mogols, to assure the Viceroy that the Sultan Aureng Zeb would be always ready to assist the Portuguese against their Enemies; And the Viceroy was sending Don Foam Antanez, Governor of the slies of Solor and Timor, his Ambassador to the said Prince. The Fleet of the Mogols was likewise arrived at Goa.

Naples, November 28. The Popes Gallies are still detained by the bad weather at Puzzole, having as we are informed a great many sick Men on board them. Our Viceroy has prohibited under very great penalties, the Exportation of Corn, of which there is no great plenty in this Kingdom; Commissions have been given out here to raise some new Troops, for the Service of the State of Milan.

Rome, December 5. The Pope has been for feveral days very much afflicted with the Gout; which is the reason that the Marquis Brignole, Encoy Extraordicary from the Republick of Oenoua, has not yet had Audience of his Holiness. It is said at Court that the Pope to atissic the Most Christian King has given Orders, that the Printer who was la ely seized within the French Ambassadors quarter, shall be set at liberty. The Duke de Giovinazzo, is preparing for his departure from hence for Naples, from whence he intends to go for Spain by Sea. The Pope has given the Republick of Venice, leave to buy a great quantity of Corn within the Ecclesiassical Territories. We do not yet hear that the Pope has any thoughts of making a Premotion of Cardinals, so there, are at present twenty three Vacancies; It is said the King of Poiand desires a Cap for Prince Alexander his second Son.

Venice, December 9. It was very confidently reported the last week that S gnior Molino was come with the Squadron of Men of War under his tommand to Zant; But by a Vessel which arrived here two days since from those pairts we find it to be a mislake; but the loss of two of his Ships of above 60 Gunsapiece is confirmed. Several of the Nobility that served as Voluntiers in the Fleet this Summer, are returned hither, the Campagne being ended; and Captain-General Morosini is very suddenly expected. The Letters from Dalmatia tell us that the Proveditore-General Valter and the Prince of Parma were marching with an Army of 18 or 20000 Men towards Narenta, but that it was not known what their design was. The Sieur d'Ameloi Ambassador from France, was the last week in the Colledge to Complement them in the Name of the

King his Master, upon the taking of Prevesa by the Arms of the Republick On Monday latt arrived here Signior Domenico Mocenigo late Proveditore of Balmatia. All our advices from the Levant affore us the Turks are making very great Preparatio is against the next Summar.

Marjeilles, Dec 8. They are yery hard at work here to put the Gallies into a cordition to fail upon the first Orders; and at Thoulon a Squadron of Men of War and several Galliots are fitting out with the fame diligence; defigned, as is generally believed, against the Genoueies, who, as we understand, are as far as ever from making their Peace with this Crown. By a Velfel arrived from Malta we have an account, that their Gallies, which were lent to the affiftance of the Venetians this Summer, were returned home, having left in the actions they were engaged in with the Enemy, but two Knights and 60 Common Soldiers, but that in the Incursion the Troops made into the Turkith Territories, they fell into Distempers of which there died within the space of a month 20 Knights and above 200 Soldiers of Malsa.

Paris, December, 23. The Courier that was

lately sent to Rome, is expected back this week with the final Resolution of the Republick of Genoua, concerning the satisfaction the King expects from them, the time his Majesty gave them to declare themselves in, being now ready to expire. There is a design of cutting a Canal from the River Eure a little above Chartres to Verfailles, which may be with the turnings they must make about thirty five miles: It will be a great Work, and it's said 30000 Men will be constantly employed in it. The Count de Soissons returned hither the last week from Turin.
