Cracow, December 1.

He Nobility of Linbuaria have at laft confented that the Dyet Inill be held at Warfaw; And the time of its meeting is, we are told, fixed for the zoth of February. The

Rang intends to continue in the meantime at Zolkiew; where it's faid Deputies are expected from Count Teckeley. The Envoy from The Cham of Tartary was arrived at Zolkiew, but had not, when the last Letters came from thence, had Audience of the King, fo that it was not known What he had to propofe.

Dantzicks, December 20. The Letters' from Poland give an account, that the Moscovites have Invaded the Territories of that Crown, and have posses of two or three small places Within the Dutchy of Lisbuania, at the Infligation, as is believed, of the Turks with whom it's ob-Terved they have at prefent a very good correlpon-tience. They likewife tell us, that the Dyet is appointed to be held at Warfaw about the middle of February, but that it will be a very fhort Seffion, the Conjuncture of Affairs requiring Tpeedy Refolutions, to enable the King to make the necellary preparations for the next Campagne.

Naples, December 5. The Popes Gallies, after having been detained fome time by the ill weather at Puzzole, parted from thence the laft week ; but were forced to put into Gaene, fibm whence they Tailed again the first Instant.

Rome, December 9. The Pope continues in-disposed, which is the reason that the Marquis the Brignole, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of Genoua, hath not yet had his Audience; but he has been several times in Conference with Cardinal Pio His first Minister. The Pope's Gallies arrived at Civita Vecebia on Saturday last; and most of the Officers are tome hither; They have loft during this Gampagne 100 Soldiers and 400 Scamen and Slaves. Genoua, December 10. On Tuelday last arri-ved here eight Gallies of the Squadrans of Naples, Sicily and Sardinia; They came from Palamos In Caralonis the 34th of the last month, being then 15 in number, but were separated by bad weather ; And as yet we have no news of the other Teven; nor of the Gallies of this State, and those sommended by the Duke of Furfis which parted from Palamos fome days before the Squadrons of Naples, Sicily and Sardinia, With these Gallies arrived here the Marquis de Cogolludo General of the Gallics of Naples, who was Complemented on board his Gally by four Genticmen on the part of the Senate; and is now lodged in the Palace of the This City being in great want Prince of Dorla.

The French Privatiers are very buffe on this Coall, and have taken feveral Veffels be-longing to this State. This week failed the Hanniball for Legborn, and the Effex Merchant for Marsfeilles. Three of the Spanish Genoua, December 16. Gallies which were feparated in the Gulf are arrived in this Port from Corfica, where they left four of their Company, the reft with the Gallics of this State having bore away for Port Mabon. The Count de Melgar, Governor of Milin is come hither to make a Visit to the Marquis de Cogol'udo, or rather, as fome think, to confult with the governing Men Here concerning their prefent Affairs. This week arrived here the America from Marfeilles.

Venice, December 16. We have no Letters from Ratisbonne fince thole which gave an account that the Troops of the Republick had taken Narin, a fmall Fort near Narenta. The Siegr Amelot, the French Ambailador, has taken his leave of the Se-nate, and will part from hence the next week. Signior Molino, according to our laft Advices, continued to Cruife with the Ships under his com-

mand in the Archipelago. Vienna, December 20. On Wednefday laft Prince Frances of Neubourg received his Inveffure from the Emperor as Bilhop of Breflaw in Silefia; And his Imperial Majefty having likewife Con-terfed upon him the Government of that Province, He at the fame time took the ufual Oath. The Emperor has written in very prefling terms to all the Princes and States of the Empire to reprefent to them the prefent Juncture of Affairs, and to require from them an affiltance initable thereunto; And his Imperial Majefty is fending the Count de Martinitz to follicite Sublidies from the Princes of Italy. The Pope, it's faid, has written to the King of Poland and to the Republick of Venice, earneftly exhorting them to make fuch preparations for the next Campagne as may enable them to fatisfic the expectation all. Chriftendom has from them. The great Cannon which the Elector of Bavaria made use of in the Siege of Buda, are brought hither again, where they are to remain will the next Campagne. The Baron Zieromiki is gone for Poland to affift at the Dyct of that Kingdom. The Prince of Lirbtenfleyn has done Homage to the Emperor for the Dutchy of Fagerfaorff in Si-Tefa. Gount Teckeley, it's laid, has had the confidence to fignifie to the Emperor, That if his Im-perial Majelty defire it, he will take it upon him to procure a Peace between his Imperial Majefty and of Wood the Senate have cauled four great Barks the Grand Signior his Alley. from before *Biperier*, was forced to leave fome of his fick Men behind him. The Duke of Lorrain hath, it's faid, given the Emperor a large account in writing of the Siege of Buda; Wherein he makes great complaints againft fome Eminent Officers who did not obey his Orders; 'For which they will be queffioned before a Council of War.

Ratisbonne, December 25. It's certain that the Moleovites have made an Invalion into Lichuania, which it's f. ared may occasion a breach between them and the Crown of *Poland*. They write likewife that the laft Campagne did very much weaken the Polish Army, the Troops suffering extremely by the ill weather; and belides a great many Prifoners being taken by the Turks and Tertars ; and tell us particularly that of 2000 Men which the Elector of Brandenburg fent to the affiliance of that Crown, there are not above 200 left. We have Letters from Hungary which fay, that the Turks have put fome Men into Newbeufel; and that they are preparing a great Convoy of Provisions for the reli f of that Garifon, which is in much want thereof. The Imperialists on the other fide are taking care to focure the pailages near the place, which they will keep very close blocked up this Winter.

Francfort, Decemb. 27. The Letters from Eungary tell us. that General Schultz having been obliged by the weather and want of Provisions to raife the Siege of Esperies, hath put his Troops into Winter-quarters; That the Rebels have defeated a Party of the Garifon of Zatmar; and that between 2 and 300 of the Bavailans have been cut in pieces by the Turks, who have fallen into their Quarters.

Cologne, Decemb. 29. The Troops of the Duke of *Juliers* that were in Garifon here, marched from hence this day; but those of our Elector will continue h resonance longer. Several Officers are come hither to raise men for the Emperors Service, and some of them have with the leave of our Magifirates begun to beat their Drums. The Emperor has written to the Citics of Salsbourg, Passar, Ausbourg, Ratisbonne, Nuremboarg, and Francfort, requiring them to furaish what Cannon they can spare for the fervice of the next Campagne, which his Imperial Majedy promises shall be reflored to them, or fatisfact on given them for the fame.

Hamburg, December 26. The Duke of Hanouer is gone from Poftlam to make the Elector of Saxony a Vifit at Drefden, from whence he will return home; And foon after begin his journey for staly, where he intends to pais two or three months. The Princes of Lunenburg continue their Mediation for the accommodating the Differences between the King of Denmark, and the Duke of Holfein Gettorp. They write from Stockbolm that the Heer Van Hairen Farted from thence the beginning of this month on his return to Holfand.

Bruffe's, Fanuary 2. The Officer that came hither the 28th pail from the Count de Montbron, has b. en lent back with an allurance that fufficient Security fhall be given for the payment of the remainder of the Contributions of the Provinces of Namur and Haynau.t; fo that we expect Courtray and Dixmuyde will be forthwith put into bis Excellencies hands; The French Intendants being already of Iatisfied with the Caution for the Contributions of this Province and Flanders. We are told from Liege that they are endeavouring to raife Money

to be pay the Munster Troops, which will otherwise be hardly kept in order; and in the mean time to prevent their deferting, they are drawn from Vifet, and the Suburbs of Liege; into the City, where they are to be lodged upon the Burghers till the Cittadel is built. The last Letters from Vienna told us, That the Emperor hath left the choice of the General Officers that are to ferve the next Campagne in Hungary to the Duke of Lorrain, who it's believed will lay afide feveral of those that were employed the last year.

Hague, December 29. The 27th Inflant arrived here a Deputation from the Town of Ders confifting of seven Persons, who had yesterday a long Conference with the Prince of Orange; And this morning they went home again. The Court of Holland in the mean time have fulpended the Scout of Dort (who is the Principal Officer of that Place) for not ob. ying their Orders, but he continues notwithflanding to execute his Office, and the Magistrates of Dors have promised to Protect and fecure him from all damage on that account. This day arrived here the Heer Space, Licutenant-General of the Elector of Brandenburg's Forces, but we do not hear that he comes with any publick Commission. The Magistrates of Rotterdam, understanding that the ships of that Town are not suffered to lade or unlade in the Ports of France, have thereupon made their Application by their Deputies to the Freich AmbaG fador here, who, as we are informed, told them that they ought not to be furprized at it, feeing they had made an Order, by vertue of which the French thips at Rotterdam are not permitted to take in any Goods till the Veffels of that Town are firft laden, whereby his most Christian Majefly's Subjects have fullained great lofs and prejudice ; upon which those Magistrases have promised to revoke the faid Order. The Ships bound for the Eall Indies failed out of the Texel on Sunday laft.

Hague, Fanuary 2. The j I paft arrived here other Deputies from the Town of Dort, who were yesterday with the Prince of Orange; It's faid that the matters now in dispute between that City and the Court of Holland will be accommodated. The Magistrates of Amsterdam are going to raise two Troops of Hotse to consist of 100 men each. The buliness of Rosterdam is, we are told, adjusted.
