Efferday arrived here an Express with Letters from the Count de Forger, Governor of Leuischau in Opper Hungary, written the 16 Instant, wherein he gives an acount, That General Schultz had the

day before fallen upon Count Terke-ley. who was marching with a Body of Hungarians to joyn the Turks, and had defeated him, killing many of his men, and having taken all his Baggage, and the Coach of the Count Nadafti, he himlelf ekaping very narrowly; And that General Schultz had fent 500 Horfe in purfuit of the reft. The Emperor, we are told, has given orders for the removing the Bavarians, who are at prefent lodged in places exposed to the Enemy, into better and fecurer Quarters. The Governor of Raab has fent an Officer to acquaint the Emperor that a Chiaus is arrived there from the Vifier of Bude, and to know this Imperial Majefly's pleafure whether he shall fuffer him to continue his journey hither, or find him back again. The Advices we receive from the Turkila Territories isform us, That the Viker of Buds has fent all the Women and Children, and the Mon that are unfit for Service, to Balgrade, and that notwithstanding there is at Bude great want of Provisions, occasioned chiefly by the Parties fent out from Virovitza (which place General Leflie made himfelf Mafter of the last Summer) who making their Incurfions as far as the Bridge of Effeck, dovery much interrupt the paffage of the Carriages on that fide, and confequently hinder the Turks at Buda from receiving the lupplies which would otherwife be brought them from those parts. The Enemy have had a defign to build a Bridge over the Danube near Gran in order to diflurb the Imperialiss in their Quarters, but it hath been prevented. We do not hear that the Moleovites have committed any farther Hostilities upon the Subjects of the Crown of Poland.

Fienna, December 30. The 29th Inflant arrived here an Officer fent by General Schultz to give the Emperor an account of the defeat of Count Teckeley; The Particulars are thus related. Count Teckeley having got together between 4 and 5000 men, and marching to joyn 5 or 6000 Turks and Tartars which the Baffa of Agris had drawn into a Body for the relief of Newbeufel, General Schultz, upon advice of it, affembled the Troops under his command to the number of about 4000 men, and manched with fo much fpeed that he overtook Count Teckeley the 15th Inflant near Tglo, and fell upon him fo unexpectedly, that he had hardly time to put himfelf into a poflure of defence; About 300 of his men were killed and 100 taken prifoners, the refi fied, but had not the Soldiers loft time in plundering, Count Teckeley and Count Nadafli had in all probability been both taken; They left behind them all their Baggage, among which was a little Silver Trunk with Teckeley's private Letters and Writings, which are brought Wither, and make, it's faid, a great difference of the solution

We have advice from Lementz that 890 Hullars had deleated a Party of 1500 Partars who were ravaging that Country, but that a Body of Furks coming to their affiltance the Hulsars were obliged to retire with confiderable loss. The Spanish ingenier who lately arrived here from Flanders, hath made a trial of his skill before the Duke of Lorrain with much approbation.

Bruffels, Fanuary 12. Yeflefday was published here a Placaet commanding all Officers to repair immediately to their respective Garisons, where a review will be taken of all the Troops on the 15th Infant, and a months Pay given them, after which, it's faid, a Reform will be made, and the Troops re used to fuch a number as that they may he duly The Count de Bergercke, who is made Inpaid. tendent General of Flanderi, Haynault and Brabant, has undertaken to pay the Troops in this Province, and in Charleroy, Mons, and Acte, upon the lame foot with those in Flanders ; He parted from hence reflerday to vifit all the Garifons of this Province, Another Placact has been published commanding the Soldiers to keep within their respective Garilons, and declaring, That if any that be taken upon the Highways after the 15th of this month without a Pais Signed by the Marquis de Grans, they shall be immediately hanged in the places where they are taken, and the Provoft of the Court, the Droffart of Brahant, and the Marefohal-General, are commanded to have their Companios abroad for the executing the faid Placaet; and the Mayeurs and Officers in the leveral Towns and Villages are likewife required to feize all fuch Soldiers as they shall find without Passes, and to convey them to the next Galifon, the Governor whereof is commanded to caufe them to be Executed without any form of Juffice or Sentence of the Auditor. And that the Governors and Commanders of Places may be more careful to keep the Soldiers wi hin their respective Garifons, and to have (mall Parties abroad for the fecurity of their Diffricts, his Excellency hath by a third Placaet declared, That if any Robbery be committed by Soldiers, the Count de Bergercke, upon proof made before him, shall fatisfie the Party robbed for the loss he hath fuffained, which he is to deduct out of the Pay of the Governor and chief Officers of the Garifon next adjacent to the place where the Robbery was committed. returned thither from Paris. Hague, January 12. The Court of Juffice have named the Heer Van Hertoghsfelt to be Scout of Dort in the place of the Heer Muys, whom they have fulpended; but he continues however to execute that Office, being protected therein by the Magiffrates of that City. The Deputies of the faid Court have had a Conference with those of the great Council about the Appeal of the faid Muys, which they fay ought to be rejected; but the great Council are refolved to proceed upon it. A Company of Dragoons of the Regiment of Colonel Heidersleven, lately in the Elector of Cologne's, bue now in the Emperors Service, having palled through the the Territories of this State, and taken their guarters in the Town of Megen, the chief of the County of that name, with intention to continue there till towards Spring, when they are to march for Hungery, the States General, upon complaint made thereof to them, have refolved to caufe the fail Dragoons to dillodge, and feveral Conferences have been held on this occasion with the Sieur Campricht-the Imperial Miniller. The Deputies of the Town of Rotterdam had on Thuriday last a long Conference with the French Ambaffador. The States of Holland reaffembled the 9th inflant.

Paris, Fannary 13. The Men of War that car-tied to Argiers the Slaves which were released in purfuance of the late Treaty with that Government, are returned to Thoulen, under the com. mand of the Marquis d'Amfreville, who hath brought back the Ratification of the Peace, and between 3 and 100 Chriftians who had been taken in French Ships, and have by the faid Peace obtained their Liberty. Several Troops are, it's faid, ordered to march towards Italy.

The New Charter which Linclon, Fanuary 1. Being come to the Hall, the Charter was read by the Jown-Clerk, and the Mayor, Aldermen and Sheriffs were Sworn; which being done, the whole Company went and drank the King's Health at the first Conduit which ran with Claret Wine from One a Clock till fix at night, and the Gentlemen were entertained by Mr. Mayor at a very Noble Dinner; after which they all drank the Dukes Health at the other Conduit, which likewife ran with Claret Wine during the faid time; the whole concluding with Bonfires and ringing of Bells.
