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W⁴ *Genova, December 27.* We have advice from *Marseilles* that a Dutch Ship, bound hence for *Spain*, was brought in there, and that they had taken out of her what Goods appeared to be for the account of the *Genouesies* paying the Master the Freight of the same; and his week failed from hence the *William and David* for *Almatip*; The *Hannibal*, the *America*, the *Crown* and the *Mary*, are on departure for *Spain* and *Leghorn*. The Count de *Nelgor*, Governour of *Milan*, left this place on Tuesday last, accompanied with several Persons of Quality, who came with him hither. During his stay here he visited all the Posts of this City; and had several Conferences with the Chief Men of this Government. On Sunday last arrived here two Gallies, one of the Squadron of *Naples*, and the other of *Sardinia*; They put in the late had weather into the Port of *San Florenzo* in the Isle of *Corfica*; And the five other Gallies got into the Port of *St. Boniface* in the said Island. But we have as yet no news of the Gallies of this State nor of those commanded by the Duke of *Turfs*. The Marquis de *Liche* Viceroy of *Naples* has sent hither a supply of Money for the Service of the Gallies of that Kingdom. We have advice from *Thoulon*, that among other the preparations making there, they are fitting out eight Gallies to carry Mortars, and a great many Barks of a new Invention, which are to carry each four Pieces of Cannon. The Marquis de *Cogolludo* parted from hence yesterday for *Naples*.

Vienna, December 30. The Messenger from the Governour of *Razb* was sent back with Orders to suffer the *Armenian*, who was arrived there with a Letter from the Visier of *Buda* for the Emperor's Council of War, to continue his journey hither; and we are told he is come to *Gomorra*. The Emperor has appointed Commissioners to enter into Conference with the Count de *Hobenloe*, Envoy from the States of *Franconia*, to adjust matters concerning the march of the Troops which that Circle have promised to send to the *Esperancis* assistance; The *Turks* had begun to build a Bridge over the *Danube* near *Gran*, but the Imperial Troops quartered on that side immediately drew together and disappointed their design. The Colonels and other Officers of the Regiments lodged in the Isle of *Schultz*, have orders to return immediately to their respective Commands; And the Officers of all the Imperial Troops in *Hungary* are required to send hither an exact List of the number of Men they have at present in their several Regiments and Companies, that they may be filled up, which will be done by the means of the Troops which the Emperor buys of several Princes of the Empire. In the mean time there is much disturbance about the Winter quarters in *Hungary*, and great complaints are made as well by the States of that Kingdom and *Croatia*, as by the Officers and Soldiers quartered there, upon which the Emperor has commanded some of the principal Nobility of *Hungary*, and the Viceroy of *Croacia*, and the Bishop of *Agria*, to repair hither, that his Imperial Majesty may consult with them in

order to the making a more equal repartition of the Winter-quarters. The news of Count *Teckely's* defeat is confirmed; his private Papers that were then taken have been brought hither; and it is said a great discovery will be made by them of his Correspondencies. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, that the Envoy from the Czar of *Tartary* had had an Audience of the King, to whom he declared that the Czar had with great unwillingness joynd with the *Turks* in the present War, and was desirous to enter into an Alliance with the Crown of *Poland*; but this was lookt upon only as a design to amuse that C.

Ratisbonne, Janu 1 9. We have an account from *Vienna* of the elect of *Coblenz* *Teckely*, who was marching to joyne the *Turks* in order to relieve *Newbeusel*, which we are assur'd is in want of many Necessaries; all his private Letters have been taken and he himself elap'd very narrowly. Great quantities of Corn are bought by the Imperial Commissioners for the supplying the Magazines in *Hungary*; where the Emperor, we are told, will have two Armies the next Campaign. We do not hear that any thing is yet concluded with the *Haps* of *Luxemburg* concerning their assisting the Emperor with their Troops, but there is a Treaty on foot which is managed by Monsieur *Plittestorf* on the part of those Princes. The Emperor having given the Prince of *Lichtenstein* the Investure of the Duchy of *Fagersdorf* in *Silesia*, the Elector of *Brandenburg* (who has Pretensions to that Duchy) has by his Resident at *Vienna* protested against it. The Baron *Freitag*, whom the Emperor hath made choice of to go in Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *Brandenburg*, has not yet begun his journey thither. The Letters from *Hungary*, tell us, that the Count de *Zabor* has with 1500 Hungarians joynd the Troops commanded by Colonel *Heusler*, who do keep *Newbeusel* very close block'd up; They have, it is said, taken already about four score Wagons laden with Corn, which the Country People were carrying thither upon promise to be very well paid for it.

Cologne, January 12. The Baron de *Meyersheim*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Elector of *Cologne*, went from hence on Tuesday last for *Bonna*, accompanied with the Prince de *Mourbach*. They write from *Vienna* that General *Rabria* parted from thence the second Instant to visit the Quarters in *Hungary*; And that he had Orders to remove the Troops of *Bavaria* and *Suabia* nearer to the River *Wiaz*.

Brussels, January 16. Great Preparations are made here for the Feast of *St. Anthony*, which will be kept to-morrow by Monsieur d'Agurto our Maistre de Camp General, at which will be the Marquis de *Grana* and all the Generals and Nobility in Town; And on Sunday next there will be a great Solemnity at Court, in giving the Golden Fleece to the Prince de *Ligne*, which will be performed by his Excellency, who is the Eldest Knight of that Order at present here. The Plaquets that were published the last week, have already had a very good effect, there being now no Soldiers seen upon the Highways, who are all gone to their several Garisons.

The Letters from Vienna give an account of the defeat of Count Teckley who was marching to joyn the Batta of Agria, and that he had lost about 400 of his men, and all his Baggage. And that an Armenian was arrived at Comra with a Letter from the Visier of Buda, who it was thought came to see what disposition they were in at Vienna to a Peace.

Hague, January 16. The States of Holland who met the ninth Instant, adjourn'd again the 12th, without coming to any determination in the affair of Dors; but it's believed that at their re-assembling on Wednesday next they will take a resolution in this matter, which grows every day to a greater height. The Court of Justice sent the last week two of their Officers to Dort to seize the Scout of that place, for not obeying their Order of Suspension, but he having notice of it, to avoid all disturbance, retired for that time: And since they have sent Commissioners thither to put the Heer Hertoghsfeldt, whom they appointed to be Scout in the place of him suspended, in possession of that Office, with Orders, in case they are opposed therein by the Magistrates, to call together the several Companies or Trades of that City, and to require them to choose new Burghermasters: We do not yet hear what reception they have had there, but in all probability it has not been much to their satisfaction: The Magistrates and Inhabitants of that Town being resolv'd to maintain their Ancient Priviledges, which they think are greatly prejudiced by these proceedings of the Court of Justice. The Sieur Camprich, the Imperial Minister, hath given in a Memorial to the States General, desiring in the Emperor's name their assistance against the Turks; Or that at the least they will cause the Arrears of Subsidies remaining due to his Imperial Majesty, since the last War, to be forthwith paid, upon which, and the Resolution of the States, to cause the Company of Dragoons of the Regiment of Hendersleven who have taken their Quarters in the Town of Megem immediately to dislodge, the said Minister has had several Conferences with the Deputies of the State.

Leeds, January 2. His Majesty's gracious New Charter to this Corporation was brought hither yesterday in the evening, having been met about a mile and a half from hence by the Mayor, Aldermen, and other Inhabitants of this place, making above 300 Horse; Being come into the Town, they marched, the Musick playing before them, up the Great Street round the Cross to the Mayor's House, where His Majesties and his Royal Highness's Health having been drank in the Street, the Company departed, and the Night concluded with Bonfires and ringing of Bells. And this morning the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen met, and went to Church to Prayers, and afterwards to the Town-Hall, where the Charter was read and the Mayor Sworn by Commissioners appointed by His Majesty for that purpose, which being done, they were Entertained at a very Noble Dinner.

Carlisle, January 4. The new Charter which His Majesty hath been Graciously pleased to grant unto this City, was brought hither the 30th inst by Sir George Fletcher one of our Aldermen, who was met three miles from hence by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common-Council, and by many other Gentlemen and Inhabitants of this City and County. At the Confiners of the Town they all alighted, and the Charter was delivered by Sir George Fletcher to the Mayor, and by him to the Town-Clerk; Carrying into the City the Deputy-Governor Saluted them with the great Guns; and the

eight Guilds or Trades were placed on both sides of the Streets, the Musick playing, Bells ringing, and the People repeating their Acclamations: Near the Town-Hall the Lord Bishop of this Diocess, the Archdeacons and a great number of the Principal Clergy met them; Being come into the Hall, the Charter was read, and the Mayor, Aldermen and Sheriffs were Sworn. After which the whole Company were Entertained at a very Noble Dinner at the charge of the Corporation; And in the evening the Mayor invited them to a Bonfire, where they drank the King and the Dukes Health, which was followed with Volleyes of small Shot, and other expressions of a general satisfaction.

The Judges of His Majesties Courts of Kings-Bench, and Common-Pleas, have last Michalmas-Term, amongst other things made an Order in each respective Court, that all Clerks, and Attorneys of either Court, not already admitted into some of the Inns of Court, or Inns of Chancery, (Except such Persons who are or shall be Housekeepers in London, Westminster, Southwark, or the Suburbs thereof, and the Liberty of the Tower of London, and Saint Katherine's, or such who are Sworn Attorneys of any Court, within the said Cities, Town, and Liberties) shall be admitted of some of the Inns of Court (If whose Honourable Societies shall please to admit them) or into some of the Inns of Chancery before the end of Hillary Term next, and take Chambers there if conveniently it may be done, else that they take Lodgings in convenient places near the said Inn, and leave word with the Busers or Porters of such Inn where their Chambers are, upon pain of being put out of the Roll of Clerks and Attorneys. And that no Person herein concerned may pretend Ignorance, publick notice is given thereof by direction of the Right Honourable the Lord Chief Justice Jeffreys.
