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**W**<sup>4</sup> *Genova, December 27.* We have advice from *Marfeilles* that a Dutch Ship, bound hence for *Spain*, was brought in there, and that they had taken out of her what Goods appeared to be for the account of the *Genouesies* paying the Master the Freight of the same; and his week failed from hence the *William and David* for *Almatip*; The *Hannibal*, the *America*, the *Crown* and the *Mary*, are on departure for *Spain* and *Leghorn*. The Count de *Nelgor*, Governour of *Milan*, left this place on Tuesday last, accompanied with several Persons of Quality, who came with him thither. During his stay here he visited all the Posts of this City; and had several Conferences with the Chief Men of this Government. On Sunday last arrived here two Gallies, one of the Squadron of *Naples*, and the other of *Sardinia*; They put in the late had weather into the Port of *San Florenzo* in the Isle of *Corfica*; And the five other Gallies got into the Port of *St. Boniface* in the said Island. But we have as yet no news of the Gallies of this State nor of those commanded by the Duke of *Turfs*. The Marquis de *Liche* Viceroy of *Naples* has sent hither a supply of Money for the Service of the Gallies of that Kingdom. We have advice from *Thoulon*, that among other the preparations making there, they are fitting out eight Gallies to carry Mortars, and a great many Barks of a new Invention, which are to carry each four Pieces of Cannon. The Marquis de *Cogolludo* parted from hence yesterday for *Naples*.

*Vienna, December 30.* The Messenger from the Governour of *Razb* was sent back with Orders to suffer the *Armenian*, who was arrived there with a Letter from the *Visier* of *Buda* for the Emperor's Council of War, to continue his journey thither; and we are told he is come to *Gomorra*. The Emperor has appointed Commissioners to enter into Conference with the Count de *Hobenloe*, Envoy from the States of *Franconia*, to adjust matters concerning the march of the Troops which that Circle have promised to send to the *Esperancis* assistance; The *Turks* had begun to build a Bridge over the *Danube* near *Gran*, but the Imperial Troops quartered on that side immediately drew together and disappointed their design. The Colonels and other Officers of the Regiments lodged in the Isle of *Schultz*, have orders to return immediately to their respective Commands; And the Officers of all the Imperial Troops in *Hungary* are required to send hither an exact List of the number of Men they have at present in their several Regiments and Companies, that they may be filled up, which will be done by the means of the Troops which the Emperor buys of several Princes of the Empire. In the mean time there is much disturbance about the Winter quarters in *Hungary*, and great complaints are made as well by the States of that Kingdom and *Croatia*, as by the Officers and Soldiers quartered there, upon which the Emperor has commanded some of the principal Nobility of *Hungary*, and the Viceroy of *Croacia*, and the Bishop of *Agria*, to repair hither, that his Imperial Majesty may consult with them in

order to the making a more equal repartition of the Winter-quarters. The news of Count *Teckely's* defeat is confirmed; his private Papers that were then taken have been brought hither; and it is said a great discovery will be made by them of his Correspondencies. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, that the Envoy from the *Cisam* of *Tartary* had had an Audience of the King, to whom he declared that the *Cham* had with great unwillingness joynd with the *Turks* in the present War, and was desirous to enter into an Alliance with the Crown of *Poland*; but this was lookt upon only as a design to amuse that C.

*Ratisbonne, Janu 1 9.* We have an account from *Vienna* of the elect of *Coblenz* *Teckely*, who was marching to joyne the *Turks* in order to relieve *Newbeusel*, which we are assur'd is in want of many Necessaries; all his private Letters have been taken and he himself elap'd very narrowly. Great quantities of Corn are bought by the Imperial Commissioners for the supplying the Magazines in *Hungary*; where the Emperor, we are told, will have two Armies the next Campaign. We do not hear that any thing is yet concluded with the *Haps* of *Luxemburg* concerning their assisting the Emperor with their Troops, but there is a Treaty on foot which is managed by *Monsieur Plittestorf* on the part of those Princes. The Emperor having given the Prince of *Lichtenstein* the *Investure* of the Duchy of *Fagersdorf* in *Silesia*, the Elector of *Brandenburg* (who has Pretensions to that Duchy) has by his *Resist* at *Vienna* protest'd against it. The Baron *Freitag*, whom the Emperor hath made choice of to go in Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *Brandenburg*, has not yet begun his journey thither. The Letters from *Hungary*, tell us, that the Count de *Zabor* has with 1500 *Hungarians* joynd the Troops commanded by *Colonel Heusler*, who do keep *Newbeusel* very close block'd up; They have, it is said, taken already about four score Wagons laden with Corn, which the Country People were carrying thither upon promise to be very well paid for it.

*Cologne, January 12.* The Baron de *Meyersheim*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Elector of *Cologne*, went from hence on Tuesday last for *Bonna*, accompanied with the Prince de *Mourbach*. They write from *Vienna* that General *Rabria* parted from thence the second Instant to visit the Quarters in *Hungary*; And that he had Orders to remove the Troops of *Bavaria* and *Suabia* nearer to the River *Wiaz*.

*Brussels, January 16.* Great Preparations are made here for the Feast of *St. Anthony*, which will be kept to-morrow by *Monsieur d'Agurto* our *Maistre de Camp* General, at which will be the Marquis de *Grana* and all the Generals and Nobility in Town; And on Sunday next there will be a great Solemnity at Court, in giving the *Golden Fleece* to the Prince de *Ligne*, which will be performed by his Excellency, who is the Eldest Knight of that Order at present here. The *Picquets* that were published the last week, have already had a very good effect, there being now no Soldiers seen upon the Highways, who are all gone to their several Garisons.
