Hague, Fanuary 16. The States of Holland who met the ninth Inftant, adjourned again the 12th, without coming to any determination in the affair of Dort; but it's believed that at their re-allembling on Wednefdey next they will take a resolution in this matter, which grows every day to a greater height. The Court of Julice fent the lall we.k two of their Officers to Dori to feize the Scout of that place, for not obeying their Order of Sufpention, but he having notice of it, to avoid all diffurbance, retired for that time : And fince they have fent Commiffioners thither to put the Heer Hertoghsfeldt, whom they appointed to be Scout in the place of him iulpended, in poffetion of that Office, with Orders, in cafe they are oppoled therein by the Magilirates, to call together the feveral Companies or Trades of that City, and to require them to choose new Burghermasters : We do not yet hear what reception they have had there, but in all probability it has not been much to their fa-tisfaction : The Magifirates and Inhabitants of that Town being refolved to maintain their Antient Priviledges, which they think are greatly prejudiced by these proceedings of the Court of Jullice. The Sieur Campricht, the Imperial Minister, hath given in a Memorial to the States General, defiring in the Emperor's name their affiftance against the Turks; Or that at the least they will caufe the Arrears of Sublidies remaining due to his Imperial Majefty, fince the laft War, to be forthwith pad, upon which, and the Refolution of the States, to caule the Company of Dragoons of the Regiment of Hendersleven who have taken their Quarters in the Town of Megem immediately to dill dge, the faid Minister has had several Conferences with the Deputies of the State.
