said insolvent shall be sold by public auction; and also to assent to or dissent from the assignees of the said insolvent's estate commencing a suit in equity against the said insolvent, and Mary his wife, and others, to annul or set aside a certain deed of settlement made by the said insolvent, and dated on or about the 9th day of November 1819; and also to assent to or dissent from the said assignees appealing against a certain decree lately made by the Master of the Rolls in the High Court of Chancery, on the hearing of a cause on further directions, wherein John Perry and Leonard Hicks are plaintiffs, and the said assignees and others are defendants, relating to an estate called the Wallasey Hills, in which the said insolvent is supposed to be interested; and to take into consideration other matters relating to the said insolvent's estate.
